Commemorate 150 years

Unveil, dedicate plaque at Ballinafad to honor early settlers

The second second

Over 100 people including many descendants of the original settlers gathered for the unveiling and dedication of an historical plaque commemorating the early settlement of Erin township, at the Ballinafad community centre, Sunday afternoon.

The event was sponsored by Bullinafad Women's Institute and Erin township council.

First settlers in the township which was surveyed in 1818 were three named Roszel who settled near the site of Bollinafad in 1820 -150 years ago. Suitably, the plaque which commemorates the first settlement, sits on the cemetery grounds at the head of the community cemetery where many of the pioneers sleep. It is within sight of the four corners which have seen ploneer traffic pass - from oxen to horses - to the present day where a modern paved county road bisects the hamlet. Text of the plaque reads:

EARLY SETTLEMENT IN ERIN TOWNSHIP

Erin Township was formed from land purchased by the Crown from the Mississauga Indians in 1818. It was surveyed in 1818 and in 1820-21. A few grantees, including three named Roszel, settled near the site of Ballinafad by 1820. Other settlers came in 1821-27. By 1828 Aaron Wheller had bull' a grist mill on the site of Hillsburgh, where Nazareth Hill later established a village. Another settlement formed near the site of Erin village where a sawmill was in operation by 1828, and a grist mill by 1829. These mills were acquired and rebuilt by Daniel McMillan, and in 1839 "Erin" post office was opened at "McMillan's Mills". In 1841 the township contained 1,368 persons.

Many dignitaries

Dignitaries from Wellington and Halton Counties took part in the ceremonles and speech-making which started in the hall and wound up at the unveiling in the cemetery grounds.

Included among those who took part in the ceremonies were Mrs. Jesse McEnery, president of Ballinafad W.I.; MP. Rud Whiting of Oukville; MPP John Root, member for Wellington-Dufferin of Orton; Wellington Warden Ken Denny, of Fergus; Roy Brown, reeve of Erin village; George Currie, reeve of Esquesing township; Leslie Gray, London, representing the Archaeological and Historic Sites Board;

Rev. Kevin Johnston of Ballinafad United church; two descendants of the original settlers; the reeve of Puslinch township, Norman Roszel, and Henry Wheeler, for many years road superintendent of Erin Reeve Stanley G. Fuller of Erin township was chairman of the

Mr. Fuller welcomed all those present to the "best farmland in Wellington County - a land of rolling hills and cool, clear unpolluted streams." The reeve suggested it might be the Garden of Eden except there weren't too many apples-a deficiency Reeve George Currie of

Small start

Esquesing declared his township could rectify.

Mrs. McEnery, representing Ballinafad W. I., welcomed guests and told of the interest her Institute had in the history of the area. She said the W.1. started out thinking of a small, simple ceremony to mark the 150th anniversary of the first settlement of the township - starting with the cemetery on the 9th Line - but it had got beyond their control and blossomed into Sunday's gala event.

The ground on which the cemetery stood was donated by one of the original settlers - Nathanlel Roszel. There was also a school house on the corner, a Methodist Church, Templars Hall and also a manse as well as the nucleus of what became the hamlet of Ballingfad.

Mrs. McEnery thanked John Root and the hardworking secretary of the W. I. - Mrs. William McLean - for the help they gave in preparing for the afternoon.

Has roots in twp.

M.P.P. John Root delivered the keynote address to those assembled to pay tribute to the pioneers stressing he believed a nation with no interest in its past has none in its future.

Mr. Root recalled the early days in the township when his grandfather went to Toronto - then York - to pick up a millstone for the grist mill in Erin, "That Conestoga wagon is still on our farm," he told the assembly. It was last used in 1939.

He recalled that Nathaniel Roszel who first settled in Ballinafad has 17 in his family. His descendants can be traced throughout the township and in Wellington and Halton Counties. Mrs. McLean, secretary of the W. I., he said was a descendant of the settler with the

Arson charges follow fire
