

Esqueusing confirms twp. holding by-law

After considering objections either in the form of letters from individual ratepayers or petitions that represented over 100 names, Esqueusing Council Monday confirmed its approval of the township's agricultural holding by-law 29-69 and enactment of such amendments as were passed.

The by-law prevents use of land in the township for any other purpose than the one existing. It will remain in force only until an official plan and zoning by-law is drawn up.

O.M.B. Hearing
 Photosat copies of all letters of objection must now be sent to the Ontario Municipal Board, who will set a date for a hearing.

Twenty letters supporting the by-law were also received from ratepayers.

Meanwhile Reeve George Currie has promised to call a public meeting for the purpose of explaining the holding by-law to ratepayers.

"Don't understand
 "Hardly any people on here realize the by-law will go out the window when the official plan comes in," the reeve remarked, after reading over the list of objectors.

Among letters of objection to approval was one from the law firm of Dorkin and Soplnka, representing the Golden Horseshoe Dragway, east of Acton.

A letter supporting approval was received from the law firm of French and French, representing Peter Bowman, a Sixth Line resident, whose property is adjacent to the dragway.

Lightning starts fire at 17 Sideroad home

Two families were forced out of bed Sunday morning when a lightning bolt hit the roof of their home and started a fire in the frame section of the two family dwelling on 17 Sideroad, near Speyside.

Lightning struck an adjacent pine tree, during a storm Sunday at 10 a.m., followed a plastic clothes line directly to the roof of the dwelling, starting a blaze in the attic of the house.

Forced to flee in night clothes were Mr. and Mrs. William Shubert and their son Wayne, 25, and Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Shubert and their children, Denise 15 and Don 13.

Remove furniture
 They removed most of the downstairs furniture before Acton fire brigade arrived. Firefighters delayed by a mix-up in the location, soon had the blaze under control, confining it to the rear section.

The Shuberts live on what is known as the old Job farm on 17 Sideroad. They have made extensive renovations to the brick farm house and the rear frame addition.

"I heard the lightning hit the pine tree," said William Shubert, "but I never paid much attention until I smelled smoke and realized the house was on fire."

Following a weird course lightning started the tree ablaze, followed the clothes line which hooked up the tree and the eaves

of the house. The sizzling bolt burned the plastic covering off the clothes line, exposing blackened wire.

The Shuberts were in their night clothes piling furniture and belongings in the nearby garage out of the early morning rain when firefighters arrived.

"We got most of the furniture out before there was any damage done by water or smoke," said Mrs. Shubert.

"We were lucky it didn't happen in the winter," said William Shubert surveying the mess from water and smoke. "At least we can sleep in the trailer until we get the house fixed up again," he said, pointing to a small house trailer in the yard.

The Dennis Shubert family's section of the house was virtually untouched by flames except in the kitchen which adjoins the rear. The rear section filled with smoke, forcing firefighters to don Scott air packs to fight the blaze.

Firefighters ran out of water and called a second truck to assist in fighting the fire, which stubbornly licked down the partitions. They were also hampered by dense smoke.
