

# Pass by-law to reconstruct Mill

Acton Council passed a by-law at a special meeting Monday to allow reconstruction of Mill St. from Park Ave. to Victoria Ave., a project which has been on and off the works list over the past several years. The job must have O.M.B. approval.

Council also intends to apply to the O.M.B. for an order to dispense with the consent of the electors for the \$31,550 project. It is proposed that the amount of \$15,775 shall be raised by the sale of debentures out of the general rate over a period not exceeding 10 years.

Length of the proposed work is 450 feet and will include excavation to new subgrade, placing of a granular base course, extending the existing storm sewer, removing the existing stone retaining wall and constructing a new wall, constructing asphalt pavement and sodding of disturbed areas.

Council also passed a resolution to sell to the Ontario Municipal Improvement Association \$304,000 in debentures, balance of debentures from the Acton Water Pollution Control plant, at an estimated rate of 9.40 per cent over a 20 year term.

# Claims tandem trucks ruining Five Sideroad

Bev West appeared at Monday night's meeting of Esqueping Council to ask when the township intends to have signs erected, indicating Five Sideroad is a class "B" road. Mr. West claimed double tandem trucks are "pounding the road to pieces" and sometimes hauling up until 10.30 in the evening. 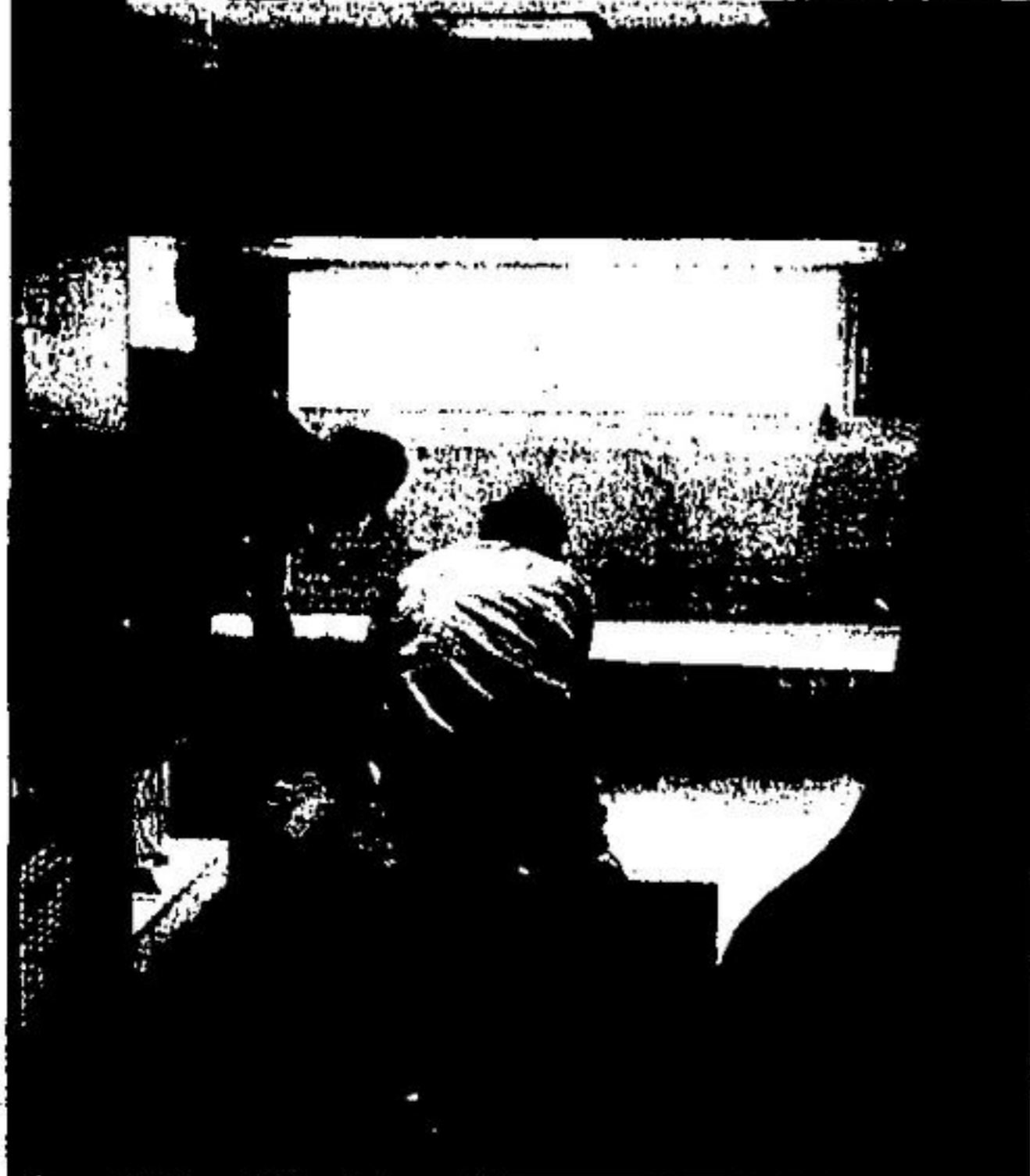
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# New use for motor home

And on the violent side, an assault and two domestic cases. A local man was charged with being drunk in a public place and lodged for the night in provincial jail, Milton, while yet another was charged with having liquor other than in a residence.

A reported case of abduction was investigated and the long arm of the law returned a local man from Sault Ste. Marie to face charges in local court for the abduction of a young female.
