Child health centre services new building

Child Health Centre Services for Guelph, Rockwood, Erin and Eramosa townships reopened Tuesday, September 15, at the new community Health and Medical Centre at 125 Delhi Street, Guelph (next to the General Hospital).

Dr. B. T. Dale, Wellington Medical Officer of Health, advises that all child health centre services for the city and district will be at the new Community Health and Medical Centre. Clinics will be held every Tuesday and Thursday afternoon, between 1.30 and 3.30 p.m.

Parents living in Erin and Eramosa townships will be invited to come on either Tuesday or Thursday of the third week of each month. The first clinic for Erin and Eramosa residents will be held on September 15 and September 17, between the hours of 1:30 to 3:30 p.m.

Parents of infants and preschool children are being invited within the city on a ward basis and in the surrounding area on a municipality basis.

The Clinic will have the services of a dentist, dental hygienist, public health nurses, speech pathologist and

nutritionist who will provide dental inspections, detection of speech and hearing defects, and counselling regarding normal growth and development.

Immunization will be offered to infants and preschoolers as a protection against whooping cough, diphtheria, tetanus, polio, red measles and smallpox.

Gird for election NDP nomination

A Hillsburgh teacher, deeply involved in education and presently lecturing at Conestoga College, Allan Rimmer won the NDP nomination for Wellington-Dufferin.

Two candidates battled for the nomination at a meeting held September 10 in Mount Forest. John Dolmer, a real estate salesman, formerly reeve of Amaranth Twp. and Warden of Dufferin County, was unsuccessful. Allan Rimmer won the nomination on the first ballot.

Mr. Rimmer, who was born in Manchester England, came to Canada after the war, in 1947. He studied in Toronto and attended

the University of British Columbia where he received a B. Sc. in Geology. He studied theology for two years in British Columbia and was National Program Secretary of the Student Christian Movement.
