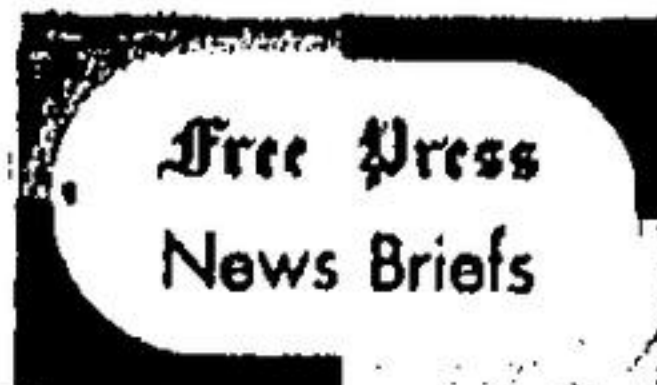

An auditor's suggestion that the price of water heaters be raised \$10 was accepted unanimously by members of the Acton Hydro Commission at the regular meeting Thursday.

Commission members ruefully admitted they sold the water heaters the "cheapest for miles" but agreed they would have to at least meet expenses. Charge prior to the meeting was \$99. The new price of the heater, installed, is \$110.

"Since we started the deal we have had two increases in the price of the heaters and increases in wages," said one Commission member defending the hike.

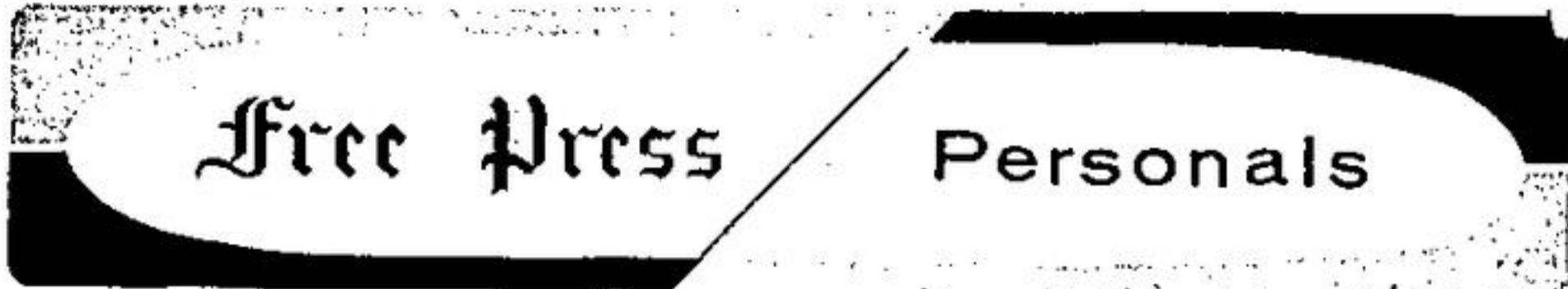
Members agreed the pens and rulers were a valuable public relations gimmick as well as drawing people to see and perhaps buy items on display.

Other business at the brief meeting saw the Commission agree to purchase 2,500 pens with Acton Hydro Electric Commission imprimatur, to pass out at the Fall Fair this year. Cost of the pens was 14¢ each. They'll hand 1,000 of them out at the Hydro trailer which the Commission has arranged to have at the Fair again this year.

Superintendent Doug Mason reported he expected to start wiring the industrial park the following week.

Permission was granted from council to proceed with installation of lights on Churchill Road N., which had been designated a "poorly" lighted section of town.

Chairman Will McEachern presided for the two hour meeting which was attended by Commissioners E. Tyler Sr., and Bob MacArthur, Orval Brown and Mayor Les Duby. Secretary-treasurer Audrey Urquhart and superintendent Doug Mason also attended.
