### Horace Blyth takes service at Ebenezer

By Mrs. R. McLean In the absence of Mr. Finley, taking anniversary services at Eden Mills, Horace Blyth took charge of the service, with Mrs. Dellys Joss bringing the

message. She spoke on the vast panorama of changes that are taking place in human activity. The government has undertaken the modification of the processes of government, feeling that nineteenth century vehicles will not carry Canada creatively into the 21st century. The education system, the structure and function of the church, the status of women, family relationshipsyou name it, it's changing. Historians tell us that in four vears we experience more changes than our greatgrandfathers experienced in their lifetime.

Alternatives

Where does all this rapid change leave us as individual Christians and as members of the Christian community? There are a number of alternatives in the ways we can respond to these changes. We can sit on the sidelines and look on helplessly. Some of us could get together and, following the example of the Hutterites, create our own private community. Or, perhaps, we should resist change like church members who refuse to use any Bible other than the King James' version. We must sympathize with this reaction, because major changes do hurt people.

There is no one simple approach to the complex changes in our world. There is a theology of change, that is, an understanding of God, of His purpose in history, and of His intention for man.

Old Testament

The Old Testament approach to the world was based on the belief that creation is God's gift to man, and that man has a responsibility to respond to creation with his whole being-to enjoy it with his

body, to understand and control it with his mind and to glorify its Creator with his heart and soul. The Hebrews developed a world view that looked forward to a new social order, that they felt God was preparing for them. Religion was a keynote in this new social order. The Hebrews proclaimed a direct connection between God's love and their personal health

and wealth. We still know people

who interpret illness, etc. as signs of God's displeasure. The history of the church is filled with examples of protesting against practices which the world considered acceptable, the Roman practice of infanticide; in the 19th century it was slavery. Today it's racial prejudice and poverty. Frederick Nassal says, "We are used to dividing our world into two camps—the socalled Free World and the Communist world." Nassal divides the world into the "have" nations and the "have not"

Responsibility

As Christians, we have a double responsibility when confronting change: we must affirm that much of what man has done with the gift of creation has been good. And because creation is not static, the process of responding to creation in the form of new ideas must be encouraged by the church. At the same time, the church must be doing her own creating of new standards to meet the demands of new knowledge.
