Appeal 1970 assessments rederation urges tarmers

Every farmer in Halton County should appeal his 1970 assessment, according to Harold Middlebrook, chairman of the property committee of Halton Federation of Agriculture.

Assessment notices-the first issued to Halton residents from the new regional assessment department headquarters in Brampton-were received by county taxpayers this week. "Sign the reverse side of the notice of assessment, stating land values are too high for farming purposes," Mr. Middlebrook urges farmers. Appeals must be mailed to Robert H. Beach, at the Department of Municipal Affairs, 168 Kennedy Rd. S., Brampton, before Oct. 14.

Keep pressure on Mr. Middlebrook said the Hon. Darcy McKeough, Minister of Municipal Affairs, has promised relief for farmers during the fall itting of the Ontario Government. "But until we are sure there is satisfactory relief, we must keep pressure on the government and the courts,"

Federation to promote CIAG

Halton Federation of Agriculture has approved a budget of \$600 for promoting CIAG insurance in Halton for 1971. The insurance program is one of many co-operative plans the Federation supports.
