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Licence fee "ridiculous"

"A quarry licence fee of \$2 is ridiculous when we pay \$4 for a dog", Mrs. Kenneth Robinson suggested to Nassagaweya Council last week.

Mrs. Robinson was commenting following attendance at the recent Ontario Municipal Board hearing of an application for rezoning of land to quarry use. She suggested Council might consider rezoning present Quarry Holding designations in some areas to agricultural, to avoid the problem recently encountered in the current hearing.

Councillor Jim Watson suggested that would be as big a fight as it is now to convert from quarry to quarry holding.

Cost "thousands"

Reeve A. MacArthur predicted the cost of the current hearing program. "would go into the thousands". She noted in evidence before the board it had been suggested the township had not acted to enforce its quarry by-law. This was not right, the reeve maintained, branding a letter from the township's solicitor of that time giving the quarry to May of 1969 to meet the by-law requirements. Some work was done by Campbellville Gravel at that time, she suggested.

The reeve suggested that new legislation on quarries would have its effect.

Track needs trees

Mrs. Robinson also suggested some trees along the race track property, as mentioned in the OMB hearing, would be an improvement.

Deputy Reeve G. Agnew noted the county, which had cut the trees in that area originally to widen the road, had started a tree replacement program.

"Yes, they planted 10 last year and the nine died", Reeve MacArthur retorted.
