Increase election payments

Council Tuesday accepted the recommendation of the administration committee to increase the rates paid to the deputy returning officers in the next municipal election to \$25; poll clerks are raised to \$20 and the rental of six polling booths will be at \$30 each.

The mayor pointed out these rates are the same as paid in Milton and Nassagaweya. Reeve Oakes suggested the rates have been low here for the last couple of elections.

The tender of Vasto Construction Limited was accepted for the installation of the Churchill Rd. N. water main, in the amount of \$48,054.50.

As no official action had been taken by council in this matter, although they had approved Ontario St., the committee recommended that the name Holmesway Place be approved.

In recognition it was explained that Holmesway Place was in recognition of the work real estate agent Jack Homes had done in connection with Headway Corporation and the Ontario Housing Corporation in making arrangements for the housing.

It was explained that subdividers normally name the streets in a subdivision.

Reeve Oakes reported on a planning meeting with the board of education to plan a seminar to try to explain "the tax bite" of each dollar required for education and to try to get "them to like it."

Couldn't criticize The seminar, to which all council members and municipal staffs are invited is to be held at Milton high school Nov. 4. The seminar will run from 4 p.m. to 10 p.m.

Mayor Duby pointed out "we can't criticize in the future if we don't take advantage of the board offer to communicate now."

The account of Milton Paving company for sidewalks, work on connecting links and patching of streets in the amount of \$5,571.60 was approved for payment. The account was broken down into the three classifications so the proper subsidies could be received on the work.

Defer work The proposed double surface treatment of Churchill Rd. N. approved at a cost of up to \$3,500 will apparently be deferred until next year.

Councillor McKenzie wondered if anything could be done to improve the town land south of the new apartment buildings on Churchill Rd. S. It was reported that the town superintendent was working in co-operation with the owners and a "high hedge" would be planted and a fence erected to separate the two sites.

Seek help

Acton Chamber of Commerce representatives Ken McLeod and John Shadbolt attended last Thursday's meeting of the hydro commission, to ask if the commission would completely take over the Christmas street lighting. In the past, hydro workers have helped put up the lights.

Ted Tyler Sr. pointed out Ontario Hydro would not permit the local commission to undertake such a project.

Repairs costly The Chamber had received an estimate of \$800 to repair the lights. After discussion, the men agreed to have hydro superintendent Doug Mason look over the lights and give his opinion on repairs. (Mr. Mason was away hunting and missed the meeting).

Mayor Duby asked commissioners if they would reconsider their lot levy for installation of underground services for the planned subdivision on the Seynuck property. A meeting with the developer was planned. He apparently felt the price was high.

Location of hydro poles in the industrial park was discussed.

No small items The high school home economics teacher's request for the commission to donate small appliances for her classroom was turned down. The commission has already donated the large appliances such as stoves, washing machine and frig.

Joint meeting planned on subdivision costs

The clerk is attempting to set up a meeting at an early date with the town engineer, town solicitor, planning board, the hydro commission, municipal council and Hulad Development Company. Hulad have requested council in view of the tight money situation to review the requirements in services and the capital costs in respect to their proposed development on the Seynuck property.

Reeve Oakes said Hulad was obviously seeking ways to reduce the costs in the subdivision. Councillor McKenzie suggested it was no secret that Hulad was concerned about the cost of underground wiring.

Holds hard line Deputy-reeve Tyler, holding a hard line and endorsing the present subdividers' agreement, reviewed the changes in ownership of the land on which he claimed a profit was made on each transfer of the property. He expressed concern if the subdividers' agreement as it stands is not used, the future maintenance costs in the subdivision would be high.

Councillor Orval Chapman was of the opinion that council

perhaps should review the agreement "in case we've been asleep at the switch in view of the growth in other areas."

Mayor Duby suggested that council should reconsider decisions made from time to time pointing out that in many communities plans of subdivision were being accepted which were certainly not in conformity with the original plans on the land.
