the painted box

This year I'm bound I'm going to get my Christmas baking done early and am already thumbing through my collection of holiday type recipes. Of course, that doesn't mean much, but it's a good start. Here's the recipes for things that went over well last year.

QUICK MARZIPAN FRUITS

Combine 1/2 cup hot mashed potato (1 used instant potato mix), 2 tsp. butter, 1/2 cup ground almonds, few grains salt, 1 tsp. vanilla, 1 tsp. almond flavoring. Gradually add confectioners' sugar, stirring until mixture is no longer sticky (takes about 4 1/2 cups, altogether). Pull off small rounds of dough and shape into fruit about 1 or 2 inches in length. Let stand about 2 hours to dry, then tint and decorate.

STRAWBERRIES: Make a glaze of 1 Tbsp. light corn syrup and 3/4 tsp. water. Dip fruit, then roll in coarse red sugar. Cut a

strawberry leaf from green paper and attach with piece of green toothpick.

PEACHES: Combine a few drops of yellow food coloring with a drop of red and a few drops of water. Apply to peaches with a brush. Brush one side lightly with diluted red coloring.

LIMES: Mix about 12 drops yellow coloring with 1 drop green, dilute with a few drops water. Pinch a small ball of dough slightly at both ends to make it oval. Brush with color.

PEARS: Dilute yellow coloring with water till quite pale, and brush pear shapes. Tint one side with diluted red, and insert a clove in top for the stem.

APPLES: Mix a few drops red coloring with a few drops of water, and brush apple shapes. Cut small leaves from green paper and attach at top with small piece of green toothpick.

The fruits may be hung on a small Christmas tree by straightening the hook of a wire ornament hanger and carefully running it through the fruit so that the fruit rests on the little loop at the end of the hanger. Bend wire over to hang on tree.

BRAZIL NUT CAKE

In a large bowl, combine 1 pound shelled Brazil nuts (about five of the 3 oz. packages), 1 lb. finely cut dates, 1 1/4 cups maraschino cherries. Sift 3/4 cup flour, 3/4 cup sugar, 1/2 tsp. baking powder, 1/2 tsp. salt, add to fruit and mix well with hands. Beat 3 eggs till foamy, add 1 tsp. vanilla, stir into nut mixture till well mixed. Pour into greased, lined loaf pan and bake at 350 degrees until well browned, about an hour. Cool on a rack, wrap in cheesecloth soaked in grapefruit juice or sherry or brandy or something, and store in frig or cool place.

SHORTBREAD

Cream 1/2 cup butter, 1/2 cup shortening, 1/2 cup brown sugar (packed). Add 2 1/2 cups flour and pound on pastry sheet until desired thickness. Cut in squares. Baked on ungreased cookie sheet at 300 degrees for 20 minutes.

POPCORN BALLS

Mix 1 pkg. Jelly powder (small size, any flavor, but cherry is nice) with 1/4 cup white sugar, 1/2 cup corn syrup, in a pan. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly, over medium heat. Pour over 4 quarts popped popcorn, mix and let stand for a minute. Butter your hands and form the mixture into balls. We wrap them in clear plastic food wrapping, tie them with ribbons, and hang them on the tree.
