

Chickens, barn door in stream

Students, adults turn up trash in creek beautification blitz

A bag of dead chickens, an old barn door and the pickup bed of a truck were just a few of the discarded items picked up along the banks of Sixteen Mile Creek in Milton recently. Twenty-four students from Acton and Milton High Schools and numerous members of Operation Survival (Milton's anti-pollution group) scoured the banks for litter as part of their fall clean-up.

John Horner of Milton and Keith Black of Acton headed the teams of students. "We were really surprised at all the material in the stream," said Mr. Horner. "Some of it is too big for five or 10 students to tackle. The old barn door we found was tied with rope and pulled downstream by the students. What we need is

a chain saw, some cable and a front-end loader to clear the debris out."

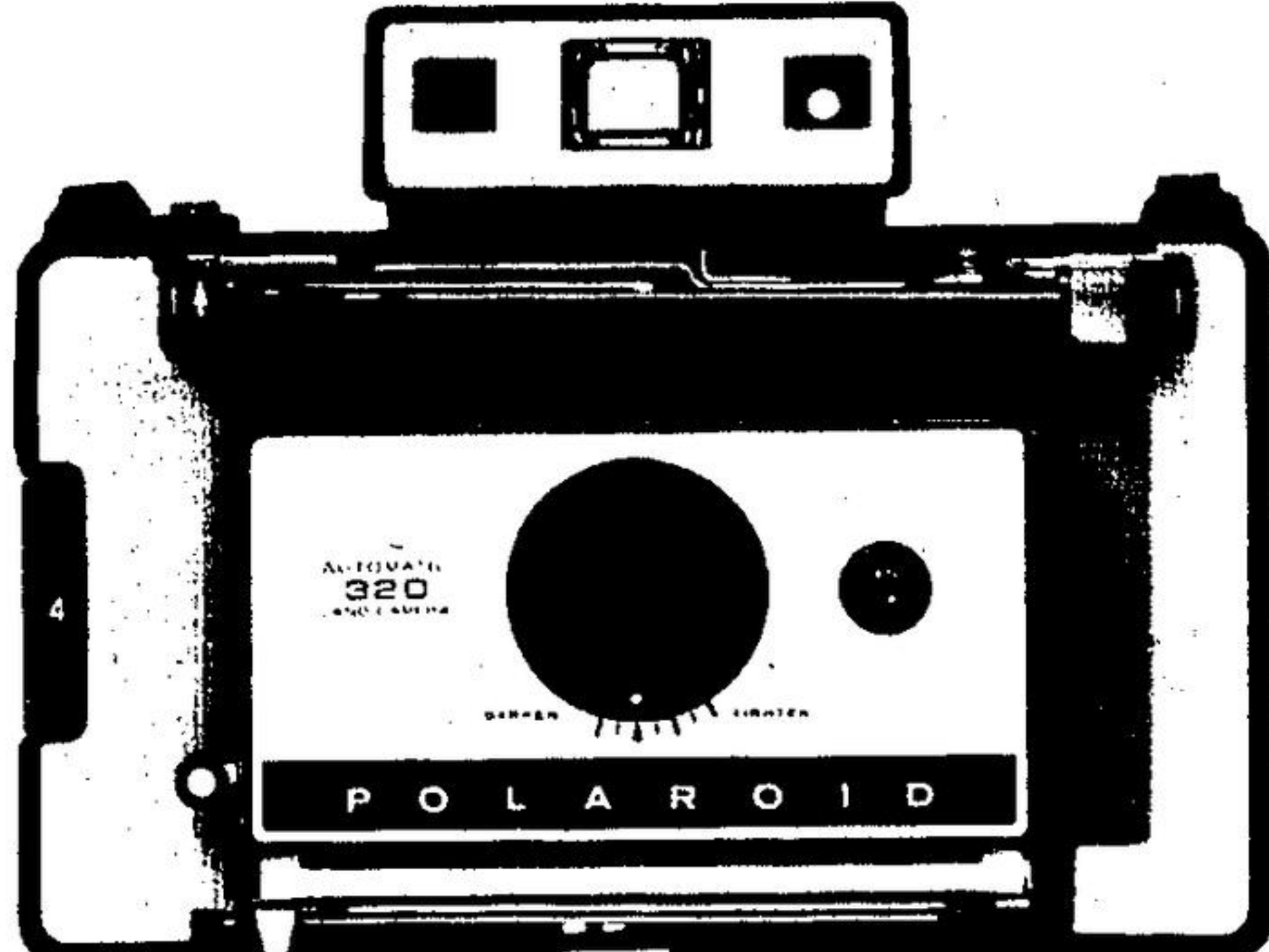

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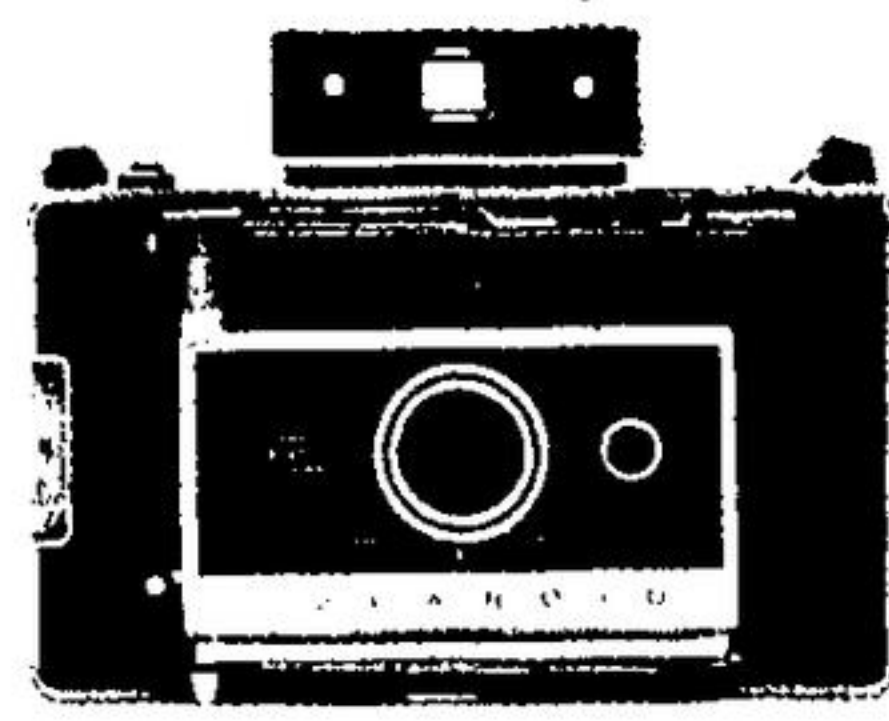
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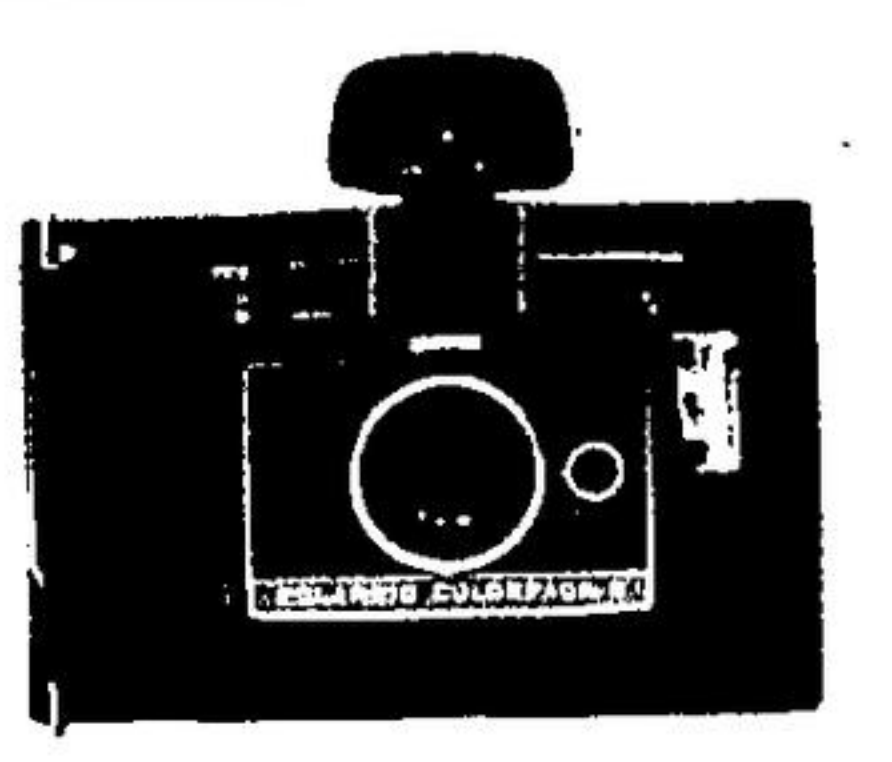


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
