Acton Parks and Recreation Committee will leave the decision on a charge for floor rental for Acton Rams junior lacrosse team for the 1971 season, up to next year's committee.

A three man Ram delegation, manager Alan Hall, coach Howard Dwyer and president Ron McKnight appeared at the committee's regular meeting Thursday night to ask about rates for the 1971 season. The team used the arena a total of 108 hours this year and were charged \$380, 80 hours at \$3 per hour and 28 hours at \$5 per hour.

Chairman Peter Marks sald he thought it should be left up to next year's committee to set a floor rental charge, but expressed the opinion the charge would not be too far off this year's figure.




