

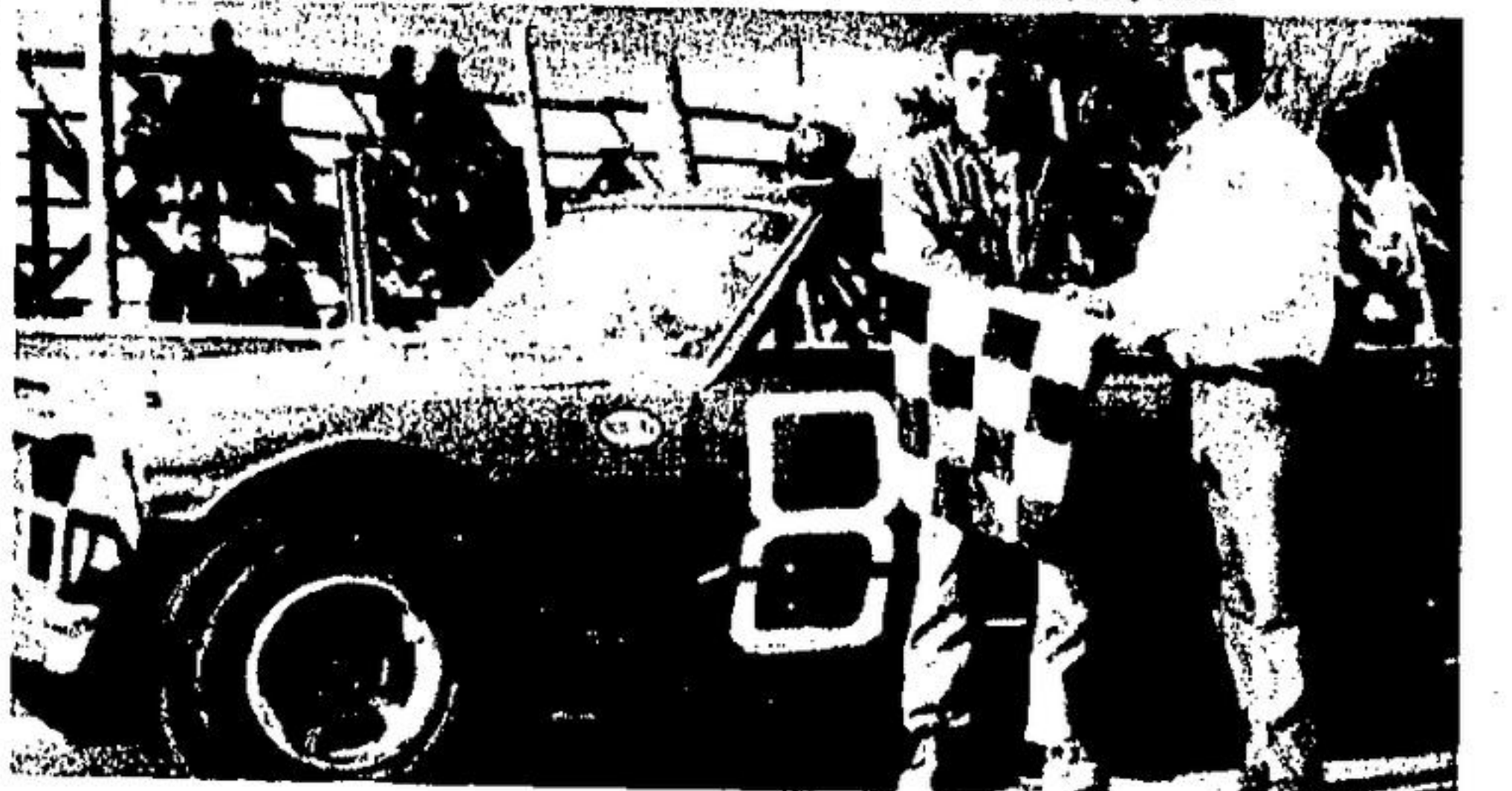
Declare Wallace, Majuery Acton Speedway champs

New committee to set lacrosse team charges

Acton Parks and Recreation Committee will leave the decision on a charge for floor rental for Acton Rams junior lacrosse team for the 1971 season, up to next year's committee. A three man Ram delegation, manager Alan Hall, coach Howard Dwyer and president Ron McKnight appeared at the committee's regular meeting Thursday night to ask about rates for the 1971 season. The team used the arena a total of 108 hours this year and were charged \$380, 80 hours at \$3 per hour and 28 hours at \$5 per hour. Chairman Peter Marks said he thought it should be left up to next year's committee to set a floor rental charge, but expressed the opinion the charge would not be too far off this year's figure. Won't come down Councilor Orval Chapman went a little further in his assessment. Referring to the \$3 charge he said "It sure won't come down next year." Councilor Chapman said it was costing the committee more than \$3 per hour to keep men on duty at the arena. He said he couldn't see recreation being totally

Chairman Marks countered with the suggestion the committee's overhead was not \$3 per hour for many of the hours the team used the arena. The committee had budgeted to gain \$300 revenue from the team for this season, but received \$380. Mr. Laughlin's motion was based on half of the excess revenue of \$80. The motion passed, but was
