

# Acton District High juniors cross-country champs

A second place finish by Pete Morrison, a fourth place finish by George McPhail and a tenth by Glen McKenzie sparked Acton District High School's junior cross-country team to the Halton County championship in the Halton Secondary Schools meet in Acton, Monday.

David Tomlinson of Acton placed 11th and Steve Marshall 31st, as the ADHS Redmen totalled 27 points. Burlington Central placed second with 34 points. Rod Keepine of Burlington Lord Elgin won the race in a time of 14:48.

Burlington M.M. Robinson

placed four runners in the top ten to walk off with the Ladies' Open title. The winners totalled 34 points to Burlington Central's 54. Robin Lee of Oakville-Trafalgar High School won the race in a time of 8:05.

Perry Mella of White Oaks Secondary School placed first in the midget boy's race in a time of 15:47, but Oakville T.A. Blakelock captured the team title with 37 points, followed by M.M. Robinson with 42.

White Oaks earned the senior boy's crown, placing three runners in the top ten and totalling 32 points. Burlington

Central took second place with 56. Bill Maunday of Oakville Perdue won the race in a spectacular time of 13:54.

Ladies' open was run over a 1 1/4 mile course, while all boys' events were 2 1/4 miles.
