Remand charges to November 23

Charges levied against the Golden Horseshoe Dragway will be heard on November 23 at Milton Court, Peter Bowman told Esquesing council Monday night.

The case was first heard Monday and remanded until November 23 when the Attorney General will also prosecute the Dragway for violating the Lord's Day Act, Mr. Bowman told council.

Mr. Bowman also complained about the state of the hill leading from the Sixth Line to the reconstruction on 7 Highway and the absence of a sign designating the Sixth Line.

The reeve agreed there should be a sign. He suggested, "Peter Bowman lives here" as suitable.

But Councillor Miller told Mr. Bowman there wasn't much council could do with the hill until the highway was completed.

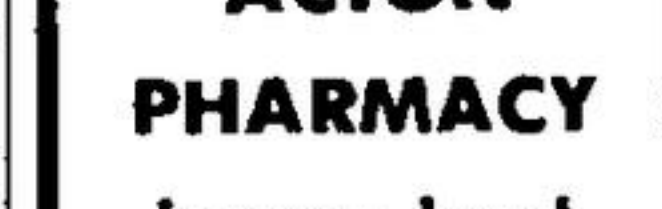
