

Let's Play Bridge

Aces were made to capture kings and kings were made to capture queens and queens were made to capture jacks and so on down the list. Anytime this doesn't happen, someone is likely. to lose a trick.

If an ace cannot capture a king, it should at least capture a queen or a jack so as not to be wasted. Here is a hand where a defender forgot this and as a result, declarer brought home an un-

makeable contract. East dealt with North-South valnerable.

NORTH S-A J 10 H-J \$ 7 2 D-Q \$ 8 4 C-A 7

SOUTH S-0 (2 H-A K & S 3 D-K S 3 C-0 6

The bidding: WEST I C Page NORTH Pass 3 H Pass All Pass 4 11

Opening lead - king of clubs. Take out double

After West opened the bidding, the best way for North to describe his hand is to use a take out double. He has an opening bid and a good heart suite as well.

Technically, North could pass this bid, but since hearts was his four card major and since he had full value for his double, he carried on to game.

Lead ducked The opening lead was ducked by declarer, so West persisted and led another club. Declarer led a trump to his king and was pleased to see the queen fall from West's hand. He continued to draw trump by leading to the jack in dummy and then back to his ace.

A low spade was led and when West played low, declarer finessed the ten. East won with the king. East had a problem. A spade lead did not look good in dummy's ace-jack. A club lead would allow declarer to ruff in dummy and discard in his hand. The only suit left was diamonds so he led one.

A waste

Declarer played low and West won with the ace. Unfortunately all West won with his ace was a two, a three and a four. What a wastel

Declarer later took the spade finesse and made his contract losing only one spade, one diamond and one club.

At fault

East was a bit at fault for not leading the diamond nine. This should show no higher cards and hence declarer is marked with the king. But if East had the diamond king he really should lead it, for West must have the ace in order to have an opening

Also, it would be difficult to explain South's jump to three hearts without a face card outside of hearts. In every case, himself and support for the three West should play declarer for the unbid suits. South jumped to diamond king and on East's three hearts in response. He had diamond lead play the ten. Later almost an opening bid himself his ace will capture the king, as it should, and the jack will provide the setting trick.

A letter from Eden Mills | Seek 2,000 signatures from Christian school

Georgetown . & District Christian School pupils, their parents and teachers are seeking signatures from Georgetown and Acton and area residents to add to a petition requesting financial assistance for the Christian and other school systems.

Posters usking the public to Support Equal Education for All were placed in various locations and some petitions are being circulated.

The province wide action has been initiated by the Congress for Equality in Education of the Ontario Alliance of Christian Schools. They will present the signatures gathered throughout the province on a petition to the Ontario government to back up their request.

Committee '

A committee headed by the congressmen representing Georgetown District Christian School, Clarence Baker and Gerald Hessels, is organizing the campalan in this area.

The co-operation of several churches has been obtained with others still being approached. Christian public schools, which

are open to all members of the public who wish to have their children educated according to that system's particular education philosophy, have up to now received no monles from public funda.

Pay taxes

Parents enrolling their children in these schools, however have to pay their full share of educational taxes supporting the only recognized public school system.

For three years this Congress to which each Ontario Christian School sends two Congressmen, has approached politicians and confronted the Premier of Ontario, the Minister of Education and the entire cabinet with a christian witness on politics and education. On numerous occusions the spokesmen for the Congress have presented well documented and convincing briefs to the caucus of the major political parties. The local congress members have constantly faced their members of purliament with the injustice suffered by their constituents through the inequality in education.

Now, after three years of working behind the scenes, the Congress is starting a new phase.

This petition will focus the attention of all residents of Ontario on the 50,000 Ontario public school children who are not getting a fair share of the educational tax dollar, with particular emphasis on the 5,000 attending the Christian schools.
