

# No safety patrol yet under new O.P.P. plan

Inquiries by members Mayor Doby brought up the problems at the Mill and Willow and Mill and Main Intersections. He observed the traffic conditions at the Mill-Main corner at different times and found that it was often quite difficult for pedestrians to cross Main St. because of the westbound traffic

right turning off Mill on Main St. He suggested that the committee investigate the possibility of installing Walk and Don't Walk signs to assist pedestrians. At Mill and Willow St. he found the problem to be the traffic was not stopping at the pedestrian crosswalk.

Councillor Marks said the

pedestrians "must make a proper signal of their intention to use the crosswalk." He said it was difficult for motorists to know which people were standing on the corner "to gab" and which ones actually wanted to cross the street.

Councillor McKenzie reported that school safety patrols were not functioning at the present time. He was advised last year that the local police would not be available to help with the safety program. The safety program is to be operated from the North Halton detachment at Milton.

However he said since this new "better program" has been instituted he had not had any traffic safety officers at the Robert Little public school.

Ask review Most councillors expressed surprise that this program was not functioning and asked the police committee to review the situation. Councillor McKenzie said he could not understand how any safety program could be successful unless local officers were playing an active part.

## The clergy speak out

### "CANADA: HAS SHE A FUTURE?"

This will not be thought by most as a Christian editorial on Canada and Quebec. It may not be in line with what I and others have written in this column beforehand. Nonetheless, I trust it will be thought of as one concerned, deeply concerned, Christian conscience speaking out in Canada's gravest hour.

I am a Quebecer, a proud one even to this hour! The majority of my life has been spent living and working in the French Canadian subculture! I admire them, without reservation! My "home" Member of Parliament is the Honorable Pierre Trudeau, whom I have admired for many years before he became the leader of Canada.

As a humanitarian I am deeply moved by the tragedy of Monsieur Laporte. I wait with a sense of nausea the fate of Mr. Cross. To their families I know that the Christian hope is the only thing to which they can cling in these desperate hours. That Monsieur Laporte was mercilessly strangled by a religious medal only adds insult to the injury for most Quebec people.

As one concerned for freedom and justice I regret the necessity of the War Measures Act. But again I am glad to live under it temporarily for the sake of a greater freedom and justice in the future of Canada. Those who have derided it I feel are nothing but "idiots" waiting for their moments to spout off.

But as one who has lived, and been soaked in the French Canadian subculture, I feel that the foregoing are but the superficial things to be concerned with. The cancer that has been seen in Quebec can - and it will not surprise me if it does - spread throughout the whole nation in a short while. The Zero Hour has come and I fear that even the ultimate done may well be "too little too late". If Monsieur Trudeau saves the day he will be undoubtedly one of the prophets rare in the past centuries!

I would like to look at the issue from a threefold stance: "Brotherhood"; "Unity"; and "Peace". These are my thoughts on cause and cure!

"Brotherhood" is a concept at the heart of the Christian faith and at the core of world federalism. Secularists and religious men feel equally its necessity. The Christian says that we are all sons and daughters of the same God! Agreed! But I fear that just here the message has never gotten through to Canadians. We have treated the French Canadian as the "young kid brother" - or better "that idiot brother of mine". Albeit, we have seen idiotic acts from some; but that certainly does not leave the whole lump. Most Quebecers are sensible, sensitive men.

How? We have not taken the "Bi and Bi" report seriously. Most have never glanced

at it. When statements from Quebec have sounded other than we hear from Ontario we have closed our ears - a lack of respect for my brother. Our educational system has made only a slight token gesture at teaching our students the French language. Yet many of our children will, through business and industry, spend their later lives working in that Province, or French areas of Canada. They will not be able to communicate. We have lived as though the "French fact" did not exist - and we hoped that at least the younger brother if he continued to live would at least have the "sense" to learn English, but not push us to learn his lingo - nor understand his thought patterns (culture).

It does not surprise me that many moderate Frenchmen have regretted this attitude on our part! And now the radical element has acted out.

Cause will only lead to cure when we rectify this number 1 cause. A mutual respect for each other and a concern to hear what the younger brother is saying. I believe as a Christian concerned for people I owe him that much at least.

"Unity" too is a factor. The B.N.A. act attempted to preserve "unity within two diverse cultures". We have not followed the patterns of our fathers. Much for the same reasons as "brotherhood" we have seen a sense of "Canadian identity" lost in Quebec; with the English Quebecer as well as his French counterpart. There is needed now a sense of admission (confession) that we want this unity of Canada as badly as do the moderate French.

If business and industry and English money continue to flow westward we are giving witness to the fact that we cannot wrestle with the troubles of our "kid brother", nor do we want to. Learning their language (one of the most beautiful anywhere) we will lay somewhat of the ground work for future dialogue that will lead to a deeper unity than ever. Listening, we can then understand. I vote for an adult and teen oral French class in every town and hamlet of Ontario, before it's too late.

And "peace!" Part of the problem, like the false prophets of Old Testament times, is that we have listened too well to those who have said "Peace, peace, these are times of peace!" We know now that since the early '60's there has been a cold war.

Let us never again accept the dictates of "peace" unless we have earned them. Let us never again be content because there is superficial ease, when beneath the surface of the personhood of many others there is "ill-at-ease".

I am sure that "peace" and "unity" and "brotherhood" will come again in Canada. That is my Christian optimism. That is my confidence in a Christian leader too. But it will not come - nor will it remain long if it does come, unless you and I get serious about these three basic rights of any person in "the common brotherhood of God".
