

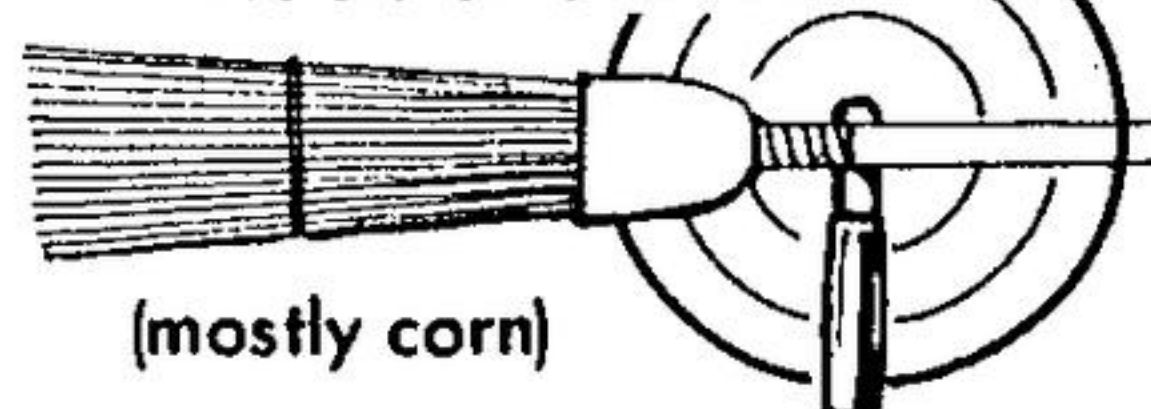
Spilling the Pins . . .
