

ACTON COUNCIL BRIEFS

A by-law given two readings at Tuesday's council meeting will set up the conditions under which connections can be made to the sanitary sewer system and the regulations governing the effluent that can be put in the sewage system. The by-law has been in preparation for at least a year and councillors expressed the desirability of holding the third reading up until the next regular meeting so the terms set out in the by-law could be studied and councillors could refresh their minds.

Notification was received from the C.N.R. and a written invitation extended to the mayor to attend a meeting in Kitchener November 17 at which the C.N.R. will introduce to municipal and business leaders a computer controller centralization of information program which C.N.R. says will "greatly improve the service available to the people in industry within this area."

Council did not support a resolution by the city of Owen Sound being forwarded to the provincial government opposed to any increase in the maximum truck length over the present 65 feet. Councillor Greer and other members had serious reservations about allowing an increase in truck length which would apply to all roads in Ontario.

However council neither supported nor opposed the recommendation.

By resolution council accepted the cost of providing programs for the Remembrance Day service.

The invitation by the Halton county board of education to attend a seminar in Milton high school was reviewed and all councillors were encouraged to attend the sessions. The "volunteers" to lead discussion groups at the seminar were the mayor, reeve, deputy-reeve and councillor Marks.

Accounts totalling \$17,152.19 were approved for payment as well as special accounts totalling \$1,548.42.

The mileage rate to be paid councillors and municipal employees for using their own cars on municipal business was increased from 10 cents to 12 cents per mile. It was pointed out 12 cents adhered to most other municipalities and provincial employees were re-imbursed to 14 cents per mile.

Councillor Greer wondered if the increase was within the 6 per cent recommended by the federal government and wondered how we could "clear the increase with Mr. Trudeau."

Council decided not to tear down the cemetery gates in preparation for moving and relocation until such time as it has been decided how they will be put back up. Attempts had been made to find a contractor to give a firm price on the project. However such a price was not available and council hesitated to undertake it as a cost plus project.

Accepted by council was the recommendation from the industrial commission that a plan of reference be prepared on the industrial park as soon as possible. The plan would assist in the sale of property, would assist in the grading and surfacing of the roads within the park and show what land was available for sale.

It was decided that the plan of reference proposal was more attractive than a plan of subdivision proposal. A plan of reference can apparently be completed within two to three months at a cost of \$2,000 to \$3,000 while a plan of subdivision could take at least nine months.

Charges, fines O.P.P. report

During the reporting week of October 18 to October 25 three charges were laid under the Criminal Code. Two of the charges were for Break and enter and theft at a residence. The persons charged were escapees from the Guelph Reformatory and who are back in custody. One was captured in Toronto and the other in Ottawa.

On Tuesday, October 20 a youth was taken into custody and charged with 'Robbery with Violence'. The charge was laid as a result of an investigation conducted on Saturday, Oct. 17. This was the second person charged in this investigation.

A total of 17 persons were charged under the Highway Traffic Act and 25 warnings were issued.

Esqueusing amends motion

Esqueusing Council Monday night amended a motion passed at last week's meeting regarding the borrowing of money from the township's capital reserve fund for construction of a new fire hall for Esqueusing Fire Area 1.

The original motion provided for the money to be paid back from Esqueusing Fire Area number 1 for a period of five years, subject to plans being approved by the fire committee of the fire area and approval of the Ontario Municipal Board.

The new motion reads: That the council of Esqueusing township accept the tender of Robert Reynolds for the amount of \$19,538 to build a new fire hall for Esqueusing Fire Area number 1, in which the money will be borrowed from the capital reserve fund by-law 20-61, and paid back from Esqueusing Fire Area number 1 for a period of 10 years at a rate of interest of 5 per cent per annum subject to the plans being approved by the Esqueusing Fire Area number 1 committee and approval of the Ontario Municipal Board. That the clerk make the necessary arrangements for the fire committee to meet with the Ontario Municipal Board to discuss the matter.
