



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
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### Limit 1971-72 spending by boards of education

Halton County Board of Education will have some room to manoeuver, but careful within the budget limits set down for 1971 and 1972. This is the way Halton Director of Education Jim Singleton interpreted a letter outlining financial restrictions set down by the Department of Education.

The 1970 limits for grant purposes on ordinary expenditure of \$500 for elementary school pupils and \$1,000 for secondary school pupils are to be increased for 1971 to \$545 and to \$1,000 respectively with the provision that no board can increase the per pupil cost by more than \$75 over the last year's recognized ordinary expenditure.

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
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
