FOR A TEST DRIVE IN A 1971 TOYOTA
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Limit 1971-72 spending by boards of education

Halton County Board of Education will have some room to manoeuvre, but careful foresight will be necessary to live within the budget limits set down for 1971 and 1972. This is the way Halton Director of Education Jim Singleton interpreted a letter outlining financial restrictions set down by the Department of Education.
 The 1970 limits for grant purposes on ordinary expenditure of \$500 for elementary school pupils and \$1,000 for secondary school pupils are to be increased for 1971 to \$450 and to \$1,000 respectively with the provision that no board can increase the per pupil cost by more than \$70 over the last year's recognized ordinary expenditure.
 The increase allows for a rise of nine per cent in the elementary and six per cent in the secondary schools. Over this ceiling there will be no provincial grant and the money will have to come from the municipal levy.
 Mr. Singleton said the provincial government is committed to paying 60 per cent of costs for education. "But the question is now, 60 per cent of what?" He said the government would have to gallop to stand still with some boards.
 No extras
 Singleton indicated the Halton board would be able to live within the limit but without too many extras and with careful foresight. Vice chairman Bill Priestner expressed sympathy for some of the poorer boards who had not gone near their limit last year and had figured on using this year to do their catching up. He felt they were penalized under the new restrictions.

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
