By Wendy Thomson I was reading through a BBC bulletin, the other day, and was intrigued by the item sandwiched in between "Farewell to Arke" and "Roses from Ulster", titled "First catch your Camel." It read as follows...

Feeds 150 "Some of the titles are fascinating in themselves; for example, Judean Hills Sweet and Sour, Honey Divinity, Bessie Barnes' Carrot Cake, Tuna Tart and Stuffed Camel. And they are enhanced by comments from the competitors.

The camel recipe comes from Libya and the ingredients, apart from one medium-sized camel, include lambs or goats, 20 chickens and 20 kilograms of tomatoes. These quantities, says the competitor, should be sufficient for about 150 guests.

There is a recipe for Ghana for Ostive, a dish of plantains, lobsters and eggs, which the sender promises 'reliably stands up against earthquakes'.

This is the season for huge bowls of hot soup, but I'm not usually successful in brewing some up. The following two recipes did, however, turn out well and we have them often.

MINESTROUSE Sauté 1 lb ground beef, 1 cup chopped onion, 1 cup chopped celery, 1 minced clove garlic in 1/4 cup olive oil in large pot.

CHICKEN SOUP Chop 2 medium onions and 3 stalks of celery fairly fine, and cook in covered pan with 3 Tbsp. butter until transparent. DON'T BROWN. Pare and dice 4 medium potatoes. Add to onions along with 4 cups chicken stock.
