Georgetown girl, Oakville boy win Halton fire poster contest

Georgetown and Oakville students have taken top honors in the 14th annual fire prevention poster competition sponsored by Halton County Fire Prevention Bureau.

Janine Prouse of Howard Wrigglesworth Public School in Georgetown and Frank Pecora of St. James Separate School in Oakville were named 1970 winners of the Bureau contest, announced competition chairman Lieutenant Glenn Stringer of Milton Fire Department. Their posters won out over 200 entries in this year's contest, which was open to all Grade 5 students in Halton schools.


Honorable mention winners are Karen McDowell, Robert Little Public School, Acton; Kelly Pollock, Eastview Public School, Oakville; John Schouten, Holy Rosary Separate School, Milton; and John Summerfield, Brookville Public School, Nassagaweya Township.

Parents of the winning poster artists will be among the guests at the awards night dinner. Others attending will include members of the Acton, Burlington, Georgetown, Milton and Oakville Fire Departments which sponsor the Halton Bureau, officials of the Ontario Fire Marshal's Office, local municipal councillors and representatives from the Guelph Fire Department's fire prevention bureau which judged the Halton contest.

DOUBT LEADING TO FAITH

One of the first men to recognize Jesus as the Messiah was John the Baptist when he declared: "Behold the lamb of God". But John was also one of the first to question whether this quiet teacher was in fact the Messiah.

This happened after John had been put in prison by Herod. He sent two of his disciples to Jesus and asked: "Are you he who is to come, or shall we look for another?" (Mt. 11:3). You see John had declared that whereas he baptized with water Jesus would baptize with fire and the Holy Spirit and he wondered just where the fire was.

John's experience is that of countless believers but most of them are unwilling to admit it for "doubt" is a bad word in the Christian's vocabulary. But it need not be so. Doubt can be a very creative part of our Christian experience.

Doubt has been part of the religious experience of some of the strongest Christians. Thomas refused to believe in the resurrection until he saw Christ for himself. When he did see Jesus he left his doubt for a great declaration of faith: "My Lord and my God".

John Wesley doubted his own salvation but persevered until Christ gave him new assurance of God's love and mercy towards him.

If you are plagued with doubts take heart; you are not necessarily a spiritual leper unfit for the blessings of God. Rather you are one with saints, apostles, prophets and martyrs.

You see, doubt wisely handled and sincerely examined may be the way for you to gain deeper insight into the plans and purposes of God for your life.

Perhaps none of us will fully grasp all that Christ is and means until we have squarely faced the possibility that He may not be all that is claimed for Him. When we face this question for ourselves and allow God to answer it through His Holy Spirit we will receive a wonderful assurance.

The key to overcoming doubt is that we do not let it have the last word. That is, in the midst of our trials, sufferings and doubts we by God's grace pass on to Faith. That in the midst of doubt, whether that doubt be centred upon Christ, or his gospel, or whether we have a part in its promise, does not matter, but that in the midst of it we do not throw away the one thing that can bring us comfort, namely our faith.

You see there are things we don't know or understand and will not in this life. But there are things about which we can have knowledge and assurance. These things are found in God's word. Paul put it beautifully when he wrote: For now we see through a glass, darkly; but then face to face; now I know in part; but then shall I know even as also I am known. And now abideth, faith, hope, love, these three; but the greatest of these is love. (1 Cor. 13:12-13).

Let not doubt then have the last word. Let the last words be those of faith, hope and love.

The Corporation of the TOWNSHIP of ESQUESING for Approval of a By-law Imposing a Special Rate on Part of the Township to erect a New Fire Hall

TAKE NOTICE THAT:
1. The Council of the Corporation of the TOWNSHIP of ESQUESING intends to apply to The Ontario Municipal Board for approval of erection of a New Fire Hall at an estimated cost of \$20,000.00, and intends to charge the whole of the cost of the work as a special rate for a period of 10 years upon buildings only in the Esquesing Fire Area No. 1.
2. It is proposed to borrow the required funds from the Esquesing Capital Reserve Fund, and to repay the Fund in 10 equal annual instalments and to pay the Capital Reserve Fund interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum on the outstanding balance.
3. It is proposed to raise the whole of the annual payments by a special annual rate, over and above all other mill rates, on the building assessment only of all properties within the area of the Township of Esquesing known as Esquesing Fire Area No. 1.
4. The area upon which such special rate would be levied is set out in By-law 17-52 as follows:
That that portion of the Township of Esquesing comprising the East halves of Lots 16 to 22 inclusive, in the 4th Concession, the East halves of Lots 11 to 15, inclusive; Lots 16 to 22 inclusive, and the East half of Lot 23 in the 5th Concession; Lots 11 to 23 inclusive and the East halves of Lots 24 to 25 inclusive, in the 6th Concession; the East halves of Lots 6 to 10 inclusive, Lots 11 to 25 inclusive and the East halves of Lots 26 to 32 inclusive in the 7th Concession and Lots 6 to 32 inclusive in the 8th, 9th, 10th and 11th Concessions, is hereby set apart as a Rural Fire Area to be known as Esquesing Fire Area No. 1.
5. Any ratepayer may, within fourteen days after the first publication of this notice, send by prepaid post to the clerk of the TOWNSHIP of ESQUESING, at the address given below, a notice in writing stating his objection to such approval or to the imposition of the special rate.
6. The Ontario Municipal Board may approve the said special rate pursuant to the statute and may approve of the said works, but before doing so it may appoint a time and place for a public hearing when any objections will be considered, but notice of such hearing will be given only to those persons who have given notice of objection as provided for above.
