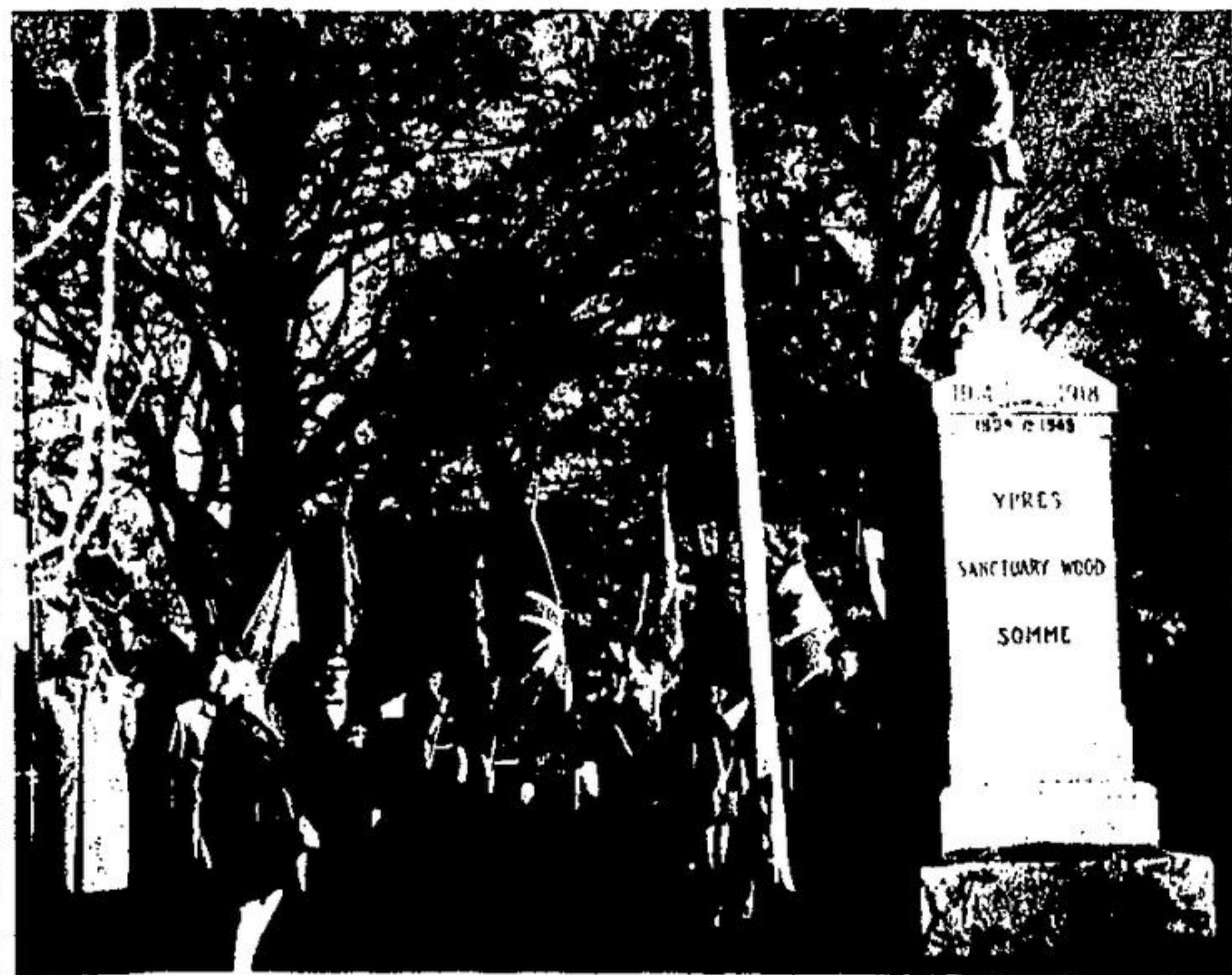
Four sites have already been offered, in four different areas of Halton.
