homes would be far more than builders intended to spend on apartments.
Mr. Ryder contended the zoning by-law stated a 100 foot frontage was required for apartment buildings in an RM zone and he found there is only a 60 foot frontage on the property which means changes would not comply with the present by-law.
Increased traffic would make it dangerous for children, he said, and the possibility existed that an overflow at the nearest school would mean sending children over the railway tracks to the M.Z. Bennett school, which would create another hazard. Nearby children were already attending the M. Z. Bennett school, he said.
Traffic survey
Mr. Ryder had a traffic survey done which showed 178 cars on the street at peak periods and suggested about 90 additional cars coming out of a private lane

from the apartments would create a traffic tie-up and probably require lights.
Residents like Bower Avenue the way it is, he said. He also said he felt a decision should be postponed until the advent of regional government when experts can plan properly.
The three solicitors gave their summations with Mr. Pilly suggesting that apartments were needed in Acton and the apartment plan provides plenty of parking. He said changing the zoning from R3 to RM was not a great step.
Mr. Holden submitted that the town had not presented a positive case on the need or demand for development and there was no evidence to show these apartments could be developed in accordance with the town plan.
The chairman regretted the town submitted no evidence to refute objections made to rezoning. "The Board wanted the municipality's view," he said.

Township of Esquesing AUDITOR'S REPORT FOR 1969

To the Council and Ratepayers of the Township of Esquesing:
Dear Sirs:
We have made an examination of the books and accounts of the Township of Esquesing and its associated Boards for the year ended December 31, 1969. The examination has been conducted in accordance with the regulations of the Department of Municipal Affairs and there is attached a completed questionnaire covering specific auditing requirements.
The Township ended the year with a small deficit of \$301.00. Comparisons of the various items of revenue and expenditure with the budget are shown on statements 1-1 and 1-3.
Arrears of taxes continue to increase amounting to \$202,153.00 at the year end or 29.08% of the current year's levy. In an effort to increase collections the penalty rates have been increased for 1970 but in addition to this a constant follow-up on arrears is required.
We also recommend a modernization of accounting procedures with the installation of some machine book-keeping.
Allowances for accumulated sick leave to employees are starting to build up and we suggest a fund should be built up annually for this. There is no consistent policy for dealing with employees accumulated sick leave - at least three different bases are now in use. We believe a consistent policy should be established here.

AUDITOR'S OPINION
We hereby report that in our opinion:
1. The financial transactions which have come under notice have been within the powers of the municipality.
2. The audit has been conducted in accordance with the instructions of the Department of Municipal Affairs.
3. The financial statements present fairly the financial position of the municipality as at December 31, 1969, and the results of its operations for the year ended on that date.
