Large Keates console created for Brooklyn, N.Y. church

An Acton company has created and is shipping the largest organ console ever built in Ontario to a historic Brooklyn, New York, church this week.

Keates Organ Company Ltd., Frederick St. completed a five manual organ console, four to five times the size of a regular sized console, for the Diocesan Church of St. Ann and the Holy Trinity in Brooklyn, This Episcopal church has a tradition of distinguished organists and the new console, one of the largest installed in Metropolitan New York in recent years, will complement restoration work and additions to their present large organ.

Fox visits

Virgil Fox, probably the best known recital organist in North America, visited the Acton plant about three weeks ago to view progress on the console. This distinguished virtuoso is very impressed with the work the Keates company turns out at its plant in Acton and especially interested in the newest creation.

The organ console was designed and builtherefor major recital work in the church. It took almost six months to complete the final stages of the assembly. Design started months before.

Plant foreman Dieter Geissler, of 82 Longfield Road, Acton, said everything is special in the instrument. Keys are solid ivory, as well as knobs, Stop jambs are of walnut with a rosewood trim. Electrical contacts are made of

silver, one of the best electrical

Compared to a regular sized church organ, this console is really complex. It has 223 stops and couplers on five manuals while an average-sized organ would have approximately 52 stops and couplers on three

Custom craftmanship It is the craftmanship in Keates organs that influenced the decision to have the console made

It is unusual for a large church in the United States to order an organ console in Canada, Keates vice-president Ken Clark told The Free Press, but the Brooklyn church officials were very impressed with the record of craftmanship by the Keates firm

and they wanted a complete "We are a small enough company to give them what they

want," Mr. Clark said. Pretty well everyone in the Acton plant has been involved in building the console which weighs in at a deceptive 1500 pounds, approximately. All employees are highly skilled with a real pride in their work-

"This is no assembly line construction," Mr. Geissler

He rhymed off some of the materials that went into construction, including over 20 miles of copper wire, 13,000 electrical contacts, 112 thumb controls and 158 foot controls.

In spite of the instrument's complexity, one man can play it. "The flexibility of the console is practically limitless," Mr. Geissler, a German-trained craftsman declared. There is also enormous combination action. English imports

The company has stuck with proven and tested methods of construction on the console which attest completely to its reliability. Much of the wiring is Solid State (no moving parts) but not to the extent you would expect. Electrical parts were imported from England where the hand engraving was also done.

The gleaming console with its intricate keyboards complicated mechanism is to be shipped by transport today in pieces. It will be reassembled when it reaches the Brooklyn church. One of the first recitals will be at the church's annual Christmas pageant on December

warted. Originally the union had asked for a \$1 an hour raise over two years but later cut their demands to 44 cents now and 30 cents an hour on July 1. After the day long session Saturday both sides agreed to an increase of 59 cents an hour.

Three raises

A raise of 30 cents retroactive to the date of expiry, 10 cents on Jan. 11 and an additional 19 cents on July 1 were approved.

Going into the final day of bergaining, the Board was ofdropped to 69 cents an hour.

Had the strike not been averted, 93 schools and 4,800 students would have been affected by the move. While the legal date was Sunday morning for a strike the effect would not have been noticed until Monday.

Cancel night classes The Board had planned to keep the schools open during the day, using administrative and supervisory personnel. Notices appeared in some newspapers warning night classes would be suspended if the strike materialized.

The base rate for caretakers will rise from \$2.61 to \$3.20 by fering at 55 cents and the union July 1 while the base rate for a head caretaker will jump from The Board maintained the right \$3.58 to \$4.17 after the July raise.

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
