Sod turned for twp. garage Fourth Line bridge opened

A special ceremony was held Wednesday afternoon to officially open a bridge on the Fourth Line in Esquesing followed by a sod turning ceremony at the new township garage.

The sod turning was done in fine fashion as retiring Reeve George Currie, 80, took a seat at the controls of the township's brand new John Deere four wheel drive loader. Councillor W. Leslie and MPP Jim Snow took turns at the controls during the ceremony. The new garage will be built immediately behind the township offices on the Seventh Line.

The entourage included representatives of the

Department of Highways, all members of Esquesing Council, MPP Snow, contractor Andy McCarthy of Georgetown, Brian McDuffe of Truck and Trailer Equipment, W. G. Kelly, a Stratford contractor, roads superintendent Bud Snow and Township Clerk Delmar French. Engineer Don Teft was among the participants.

McCarthy won the contract for the \$85,000. garage, McDuffe represented the firm providing the new loader, and Kelly represented the firm building the bridge. With the exception of a few minor additions the bridge is completed and ready for traffic.

When complete the new garage will shelter the township's new loader, three graders, three dump trucks, two pick-up trucks and will include an office, storeroom and lunchroom.

The group met at the North Halton Golf Club for a reception following the official ceremonies and was joined by the office staff.

Walter Grant is Inspector

A former head of the Milton OPP detachment, Sgt. Walter Grant was recently named an Inspector with the OPP and transferred to the Toronto headquarters office.

He served as head of the Oakville OPP detachment for three and a half years before being promoted to the rank of Inspector. Lt.-Governor W. Ross MacDonald presented his new commission.

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Better books, recreation urged for prisoners - jury

A recent Grand Jury report recommended reading materials and recreational periods be improved at Halton County Jail. The facilities, the report said, were in "reasonably good shape considering the age and type of building."

The inmates had no complaints, except about the library stock which is insufficient, the jurors reported after their tour.

An improved office layout and inspection of the heating is needed in the Halton Health Unit, the jury noted.

Repairs needed

Inspection of the Children's Aid Society found the building and facilities "adequate". The report added parts of the building were


in need of repair. The jury recommended a closer inspection of the back porch area.

The jury also inspected the County's administration building which they found in excellent condition. The registry office, the jury noted, requires more storage space.

ESQUESING Township Council HIGHLIGHTS

Delighted is the adjective to describe the reaction of Esquesing councillors Monday night after a letter from A. McEnery was read during the correspondence period. Mr. McEnery said a press report disturbed him when it suggested council could take money for roads to give to another department.

He suggested council would be far better to take the money from the educational portion of the tax bill.

"A very true picture," grinned Councillor Marshall.

Also read was a letter from Dufferin Materials and Construction thanking council for their understanding in recent negotiations. The letter stated council's positive attitude would lead to even better understanding between the township and the company.

A proposed motor hotel and two apartment projects for the west end of Georgetown which would affect the Esquesing portion of the 10th Line caused considerable discussion before council passed a resolution requesting the developer and the town enter into an agreement with the township regarding construction and maintenance for an extension to the road.

The reeve suggested perhaps the township should advise the town to apply for annexation of the other side of the 10th Line since one side lies in the town now.

Georgetown gets the assessment. There's no reason they can't have the road, too. Property concerned is the old Tracy farm.

Next meeting of council is set for December 14 at 10 a.m. when they will sit as a Court of Revision.
