Halton County Council in 1971 will have seven new members, with only five former members returning after municipal elections in all but Milton on Monday.

Oakville will have two new representatives while Georgetown and Burlington have sent new reeves. New deputy reeves will come from Nassagaweya, Acton and Esquesing.

County council representatives are the reeve and deputy reeve from each municipality in the county.

Veterans back

The council will operate this year for the first time in a number of years without a sitting past


