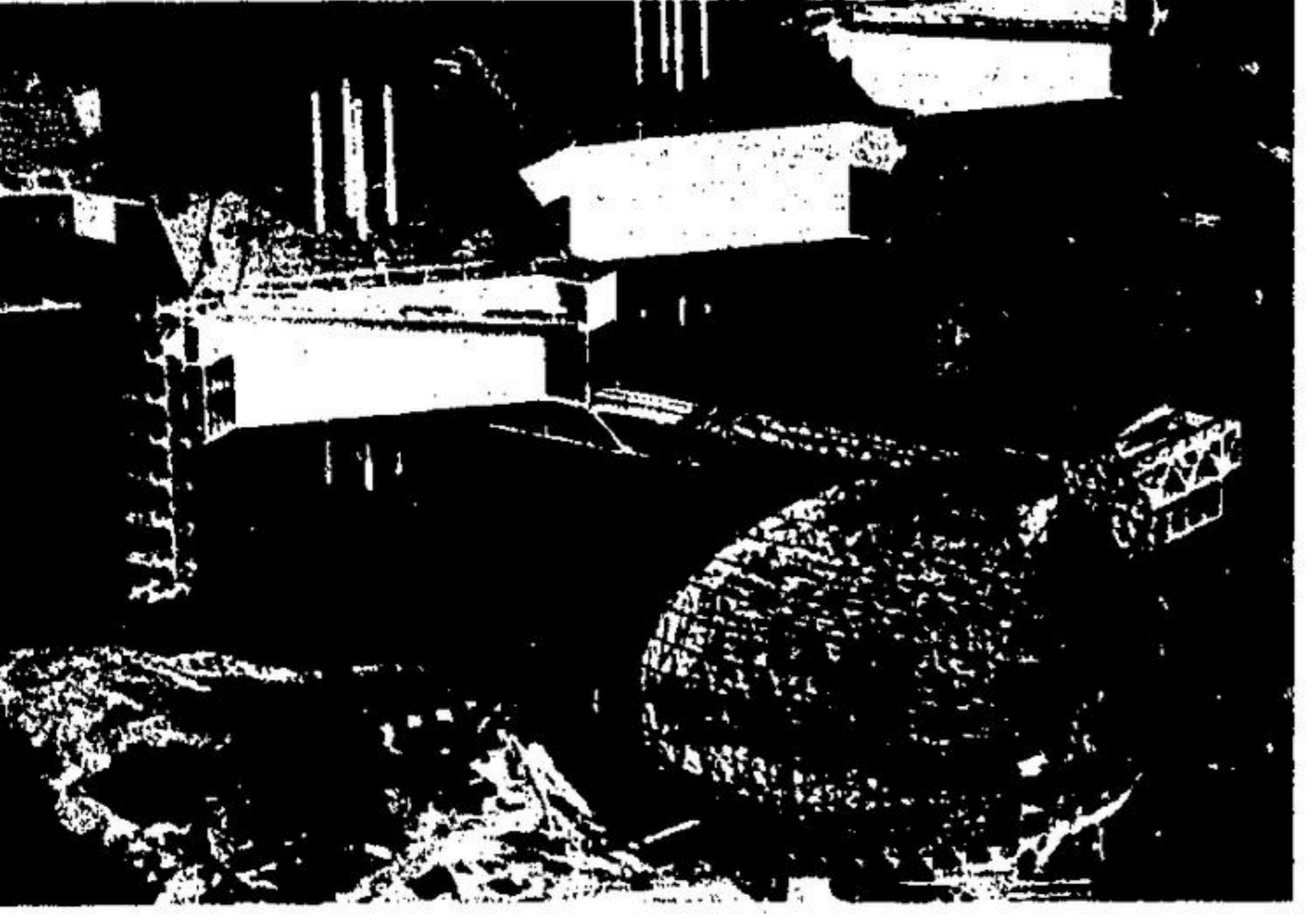
Coach James pulled goalie Steve Webster in the last minute of play but his charges weren't able to get the equalizer. George McPhail tallied the lone Acton goal.

County council representatives are the Reeve and deputy Reeve from each municipality in the county.

**Veterans back**

Veterans returning to the county council table will be Nassagaweya Reeve Anne MacArthur, Georgetown deputy Reeve Arthur Spelght, Burlington deputy Reeve David Coons, Acton Reeve F. G. Oakes, Esqueping Reeve Tom Hill (formerly there as a deputy Reeve) and the unchanged representatives from Milton Reeve R. Harris and deputy Reeve Percy Barr.

Four former wardens will not be at county council. Reeve George Currie, twice a warden, retired this year; Gordon Gallagher and William Hunter were defeated at the polls and Allan Day was defeated in his bid for the mayoralty in Oakville. The council will operate this year for the first time in a number of years without a sitting past warden.

A nominating committee has been formed and it is expected a convention will be held in the last week in January.
