Exasperating slowness approvals, Christmas lighting, Boxing Day

An early start in 1971 on the improvements at Mill and Park Avenues appeared unlikely, council learned on Tuceday night. Councillor McKenzie queried the public works committee wondering if an early start could

be anticipated. It was reported by the public works committee that engineers had discovered the concrete in present culvert was deteriorating badly and this would recessitate a completely now culvert.

Estimates up

Engineers had discovered the condition of the concrete in October and just now the final estimates of the costs including the new culvert had been received. On the original project the total cost was to be \$31,550. This amount will be increased by \$20,850 representing an increased cost to the town after the 80 per cent subsidy by the Department of Highways of \$4,170. The total town share of the whole project is now estimated to be \$19,945.

Deputy-reeve Tyler expressed the opinion the only way the project could get started by April would be if a provincial election were called or if the town agreed to pay the whole cost of the project out of current revenue. Sow progress

Exasperation in the slow progress of necessary approvals from the Department of Highways and the Ontario Municipal Board caused councillor McKenzie to wonder "What's the sense of all this committee work if we can't get approvals from Toronto?"

Councillor Greer pointed out that O.M.B. approval on the original project which was submitted in July had not been received yet and it was his opinion that an early start could not be expected in view of the fact that the additional work would require the necessary approvals.

Department of Highways fiscal year ended in April and it would probably take until July for the Department to get going on the 1971 projects.

Second proposal

The drainage program for Bower Ave. was reviewed in the public works committee report. The committee is seriously considering a second proposal submitted by the engineers. Under this proposal the main trunk line would be built along Bower Ave., go south on Elgin St. and empty into the creek in the southerly portion of town.

Cost of this project was estimated to be \$73,000. The original proposal for draining Bower Ave. would have cost \$43,000 and would have put the drainage water into the creek north of Bower Ave.

Fine times

Under the engineer's second but more costly proposal the main trunk sewer on Elgin would also form a basis of a storm sewer system for Mill St. and Church St.

Mayor Duby suggested "the second proposal makes available. five times the drainage area serviced."

Apartment height

Council was advised the Ontario Municipal Board will hold a hearing in Acton on December 28 to consider the town by-law 70-1470. This by-law restricts the height of apartment buildings to 70 feet. The clerk was instructed to have the planning consultants attend the hearing along with engineers necessary to present the town's case in support of the by-law.

Council agreed to amendment No. 6 of the official plan which was recommended by the planning board. The amendment will rezone formerly owned municipal property recently sold for residential uses.

No objection · An application has been received by the committee of adjustment by Dr. T. B. Moore for minor variances to allow him to construct a garage and an addition to his home on Lake Ave. Council had no objection to the granting of the minor variances. Mayor Duby reported that the

hydro commission had agreed to keep the costs for underground wiring to service the Ontario Housing Corporation on Cobblehill Rd. as low as possible.

No contribution The resolution previously submitted by councillor Marks to contribute \$250 to the Chamber of Commerce to help defray the cost of Christmas lighting was voted on and unanimously rejected at this meeting.

Discussion had indicated that the cost of the Christmas lighting program were not as great as had first been anticipated. Councillor Marks said he opposed his own resolution now, as it was "not as applicable as I thought."

If further investigation brings to light other circumstances he said he would re-submit the resolution to council.

Boxing day Boxing Day was set for Monday, December 28. Councillors Masales, Marks and Coats opposed this resolution. It was reported Georgetown was holding their Boxing Day on

Saturday, December 26, However no other information was available and council decided Acton's Boxing Day would be on Monday, Dec. 28 and the necessary proclamation was to be published.

By resolution council made the final payment on the supend for the 1970 mayor and councillors. Councillor Greer opposed the motion on the basis of its wording.

Annexation

The clerk reported he had received no reply yet from the Department of Municipal Affairs to a letter written in July on the possibilities of annexing land east of Acton between the third and fourth concession of Esquesing township, A phone call to the department indicated that a reply could be anticipated in three or four days.

Council instructed the clerk to secure Christmas turkeys for the full-time employees of the municipality.

Band grant

A letter from bandmaster G. Elliott requested a meeting with council early in the new year in the light of the re-assessment of the municipality which would increase greatly the value of the band grant.

Councillor Greer asked if this was a voluntary request or had been made at the suggestion of the town. He learned it was a voluntary request on behalf of the band. It was wholeheartedly agreed to set up a meeting at an early date.


