

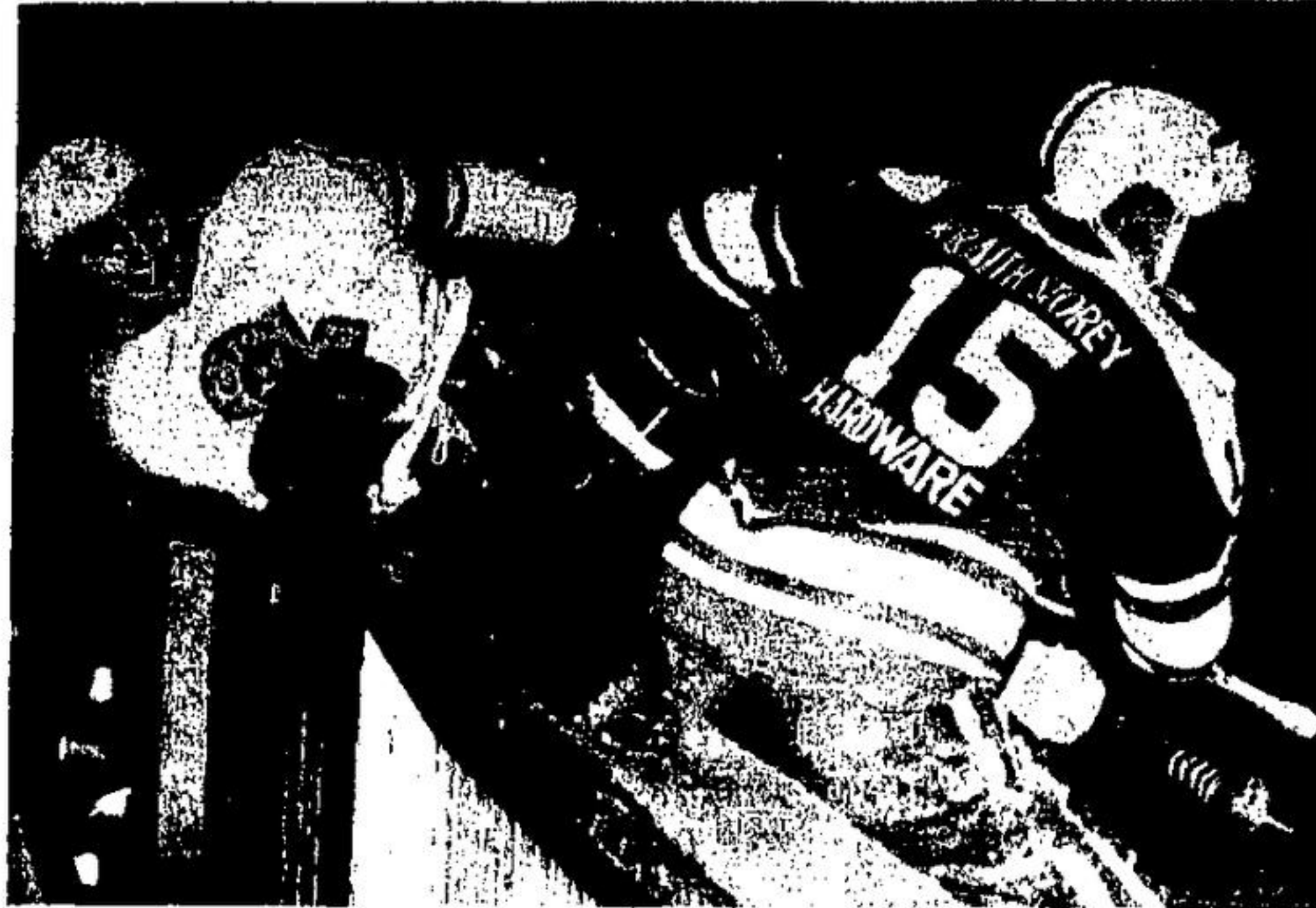
Lions goal hungry
