Recreation committee to pay 66% employees' benefits

Acton Parks and Recreation Committee's three full time employees will have 68 per cent of fringe benefits paid by the committee, instead of the previous 50 per cent, it was decided at Friday night's meeting.

Increase in payment of premiums for benefits is the same as that received by town employees under the latest C.U.P.E. agreement. Paying the additional 16 per cent in fringe benefits will cost the committee an estimated \$500 additional each

The committee also voted to give each of the full time employees a Christmas turkey and each of eight part time employees a \$5 Christmas bonus. Pince ad

Also authorized at the final meeting of the year were:

-Purchase of a \$30 half page ad in the 1971 Acton District High School yearbook. Vice-chairman Bob Laughlen suggested the ad be worded to encourage students to become interested in the

town's recreation program.

-Accounts totalling \$2,367.44 for the month of December. Major items were supplies for the arena booth and \$309 for deodorant for the arena washrooms.

-Property committee chairman Orval Chapman reported new mesh for the goal nets has been purchased and installed.

-The committee decided to allow town works department to dump snow in the park in a location to be specified by arena manager Harold Townsley.


Speaking on a motion from the Lambton Board of Education which objected to the concession, Pelletterio said it didn't really amount to 25 per cent.

Lose shelter tax

"If they give farmers the 25 per cent tax rebate we'll lose the 12 per cent shelter rebate, so we only have a 13 per cent rebate. Then if we sell the land in 10 years we have to pay back the amount of the rabate with eight per cent interest. So it isn't as rosy as it might seem." Pelletterio said.
