

Unique balloon used at Scotch Block dam

"An overgrown sausage, is the way Larry Moore describes Fabri-Dam, an innovation in dam-building implemented at the Scotch Block Dam on Highway 25 neur Speyside. Moore is an engineer with C. C. Parker, Parsons and Brinkerhoff of Hamilton.

Fabri-Dam in other terms would resemble a large clongated balloon of rubber and nylon stretched across the width of the dam spillway.

The balloon-like object can be inflated or deflated and is capable of Increasing the amount of water held back by seven feet across the spillway.

A specialist from California installed it and it is the first of its kind in Conada. The installation took two weeks.

The dam is being constructed at cost in the neighborhood of \$1,000,000 and its chief purpose is to prevent water shortages for individuals and companies downstream within the reaches of the 16-Mile Creek.

Plans for the dam originated in
