
Conservatives meet Jan. 6

Halton Progressive Conservatives will meet in Oakville next Wednesday ovening, Jan. 6 to select 10 voting delegates and 10 alternates for the provincial leadership convention in mid-February.

The Halton East provincial and Halton federal riding group plans to meet at Trafalgar Memorial Hall on Highway 5 at 8 p.m. to name the delegates. This riding actually has 13 votes as MPP Jim Snow, former federal condidate Peter K. McWilliams of Oakville and Ontario P.C. Association vice-president W. S. Thomson of Oakville are among the voting delegates not named by the riding association.

MPP Snow says he has thrown his support behind Minister of Education William David of Brampton, one of the candidates for the post of party leader. "I feel Bill Davis has the greatest experience and I feel he would make the best party leader and

prime minister," says the MPP, "There are several other possible candidates I could very well support" but Davis heads the list, he added. Snow said his personal decision should not influence the riding's voting delegates.

Send education rebates

Mailmen began delivery of \$20 during the campaign, to protest what they called the unjust and million worth of cheques to Ontario farmers last week.

The cheques result from the Oct. 6, announcement by the Ontario government of a Farm Tax Reduction Program, de-signed to reduce the burden of municipal and education taxes on farm property. Each farmer will receive a cheque equal to 25 per cent of his net property taxes.

The government announcement of the rebate came after a summer-long campaign by the Ontario Federation of Agriculture for the

removal of education taxes from property. The rebate is approximately equal to 50 per cent of the education taxes paid Hundreds of farmers across Ontario withheld the education portion of their property taxes ■BOWL for Pleasure

THE 1970 FARM

REDUCTION PROGRAM

The 1970 Farm Tax Reduction Program is the most recent phase in the Government of Ontario's long-term plan to reform the system of local taxation in this province.

This program will help farm property owners to pay their municipal and education taxes.

Farm property owners will receive \$20,000,000 in special assistance from the Government of Ontario. This amounts to 25 percent of the net municipal taxes on eligible farm property.

To be eligible, the property owner must live in Ontario. Also, if the farm property is less than 11 acres, it must have yielded \$2,000 or more in gross income during the year.

Cheques and information leaflets are being mailed out by the Department of Municipal Affairs to every eligible farm owner.
