Approve increase volunteers

Nassagaweya Council agreed to pay its share of a \$4,400 increase in the operation of the Acton Fire Area which would provide a \$100 annual increase to the individual volunteers, when council met Monday.

The fire area covers parts of Nassagaweya, Esquesing and Erin townships as well as Acton. The township concurred with the request of the Acton committee representatives and amended the agreement accordingly.

Needed ratification Clerk-administrator Campbell Thompson reported member representatives of the municipalities involved had indicated agreement at a meeting in December but formal council ratification was required.

It was estimated the Nassagaweya share of the total fire area budget would be \$5,041, an increase of approximately \$600 over last year's budget. Council also appointed Councillor Cal McIntyre and P.


