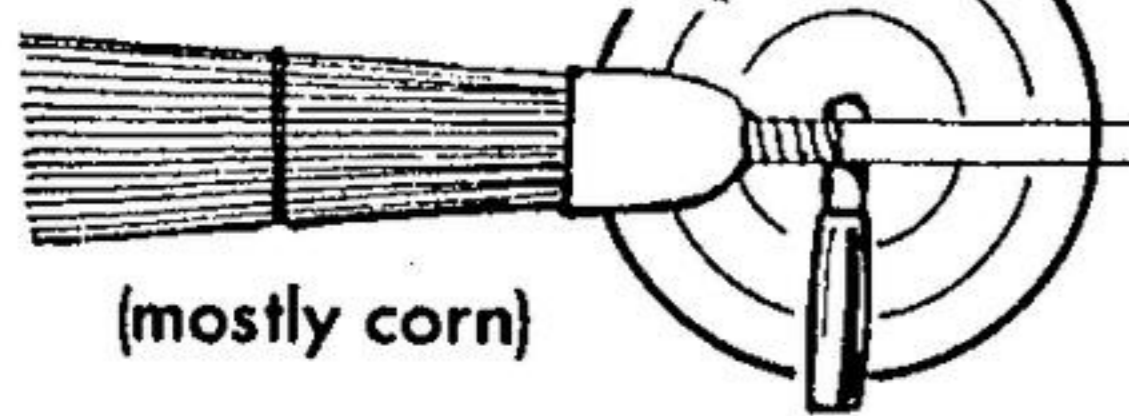

Huskies hungry after two losses
