Charges, accidents reported by police

During the week of Jan. 10 to Jan. 17, the officers of Acton Detachment, Ontario Provincial Police, worked a total of 207 hours and patrolled 842 miles of the town roads. As a result of patrol 17 charges were preferred, 24 warnings were issued and a charge of Impaired Driving was

There were two property damage accidents investigated and the total damage in the two accidents was over \$2,000. One charge was laid as a result of these accidents.

During the week there were 14 general occurrences reported, including two assaults, a reported case of fraud, and an overdose of drugs resulted in a young female being taken to the hospital. All other occurrences were of a minor nature.

In Provincial Court, Milton, on Jan. 11, a total of 23 convictions were registered for various offences and a total of \$995 in fines were paid. In two cases of Impaired Driving the persons convicted had their driving privileges taken away for three months. A juvenile boy was sentenced to a term in an Ontario Training School for his part in forging cheques in the town.
