The effect of By-law No. 29-69 as now amended, if approved, will be as follows:  
1. Except as specifically permitted in the by-laws, no land may be used for any purpose other than an agricultural use. Existing uses which are not agricultural are preserved by the provisions of The Planning Act. These are legal non-conforming uses and may be continued.

2. The executed uses permitted by the by-laws are set out in Sections 6, 7 and 8 of By-law No. 29-69 as amended and these include the construction of accessory buildings, garages and carports; the building of one-family detached dwellings on lands already held in separate ownership on lands separated with the consent of the Committee of Adjustment at the time the by-law was passed, as well as any lands subsequently approved for separation by the Committee for which application had been made prior to the passing of the By-law.

By means of a schedule attached to the by-law and the amendments, certain minimum lot areas, minimum frontage requirements, front, side and rear yard requirements, maximum lot coverage requirements and minimum floor area requirements are to be imposed. The lands affected are all of the Township of Esquesing, save and except the areas in the Village of Glen Williams, the Village of Norval, the Village of Stewarttown, the Village of Limehouse to which the Subdivision Control By-law does not apply.

The underlying purpose of the by-law is to prevent uncontrolled development in the municipality in so far as said development could be said to relate to a master plan. The Municipality up to now has had control only on the creation of separate registered lots, and not upon the use to which those lots would be put with several minor exceptions.

**Charges, accidents reported by police**

During the week of Jan. 10 to Jan. 17, the officers of Acton Detachment, Ontario Provincial Police, worked a total of 207 hours and patrolled 842 miles of the town roads. As a result of patrol 17 charges were preferred, 24 warnings were issued and a charge of Impaired Driving was laid.  
There were two property damage accidents investigated and the total damage in the two accidents was over \$2,000. One charge was laid as a result of these accidents.  
During the week there were 14 general occurrences reported, including two assaults, a reported case of fraud, and an overdose of drugs resulted in a young female being taken to the hospital. All other occurrences were of a minor nature.

for hold-up  
Royal Bank**

Two men charged with armed holdup of the Royal Bank at Hillsburgh were identified by Eric Breadner of Caledon as having helped with the robbery. Breadner is serving a five year sentence at Kingston for his part in the robbery.

Ernest Trudeau, 38, of Orangeville, and Douglas McLeod, 34, New Liskeard, are jointly charged with the \$24,000 robbery which occurred last July 27. They elected trial by judge and jury and the case opened in Guelph last week.  
Breadner told the court the trio first decided to hit the bank at Erin but rejected the idea because there were too many people around the village.

**Hid money**  
He also told the court that in days following the robbery the three had spent much time at the Orangeville race track where they had lost quite a bit of money. Most of the money, along with guns, coveralls and wigs and sunglasses had been hidden after the holdup, he said. They transferred the money from its original hiding place several times and once met a police cruiser on a back road while going through the transaction.  
Breadner testified the trio spent some time at a northern Ontario lodge before moving to Halleybury. He said he and McLeod purchased an old school house there jointly.  
The case continues.
