At 288 public and high schools Development will select the suitable films for presentation in all over Ontario, many hundreds the Ontario Place exhibit. of enthusiastic students have turned producers, cameramen and actors. Their goal: to have their films presented for the thousands of visitors to Ontario Place, beginning late May. And the Robert Little school in Acton is included.

### New gusto

Movie making has caught the imagination of today's young people. They bring to it the same gusto that their parents had for watching Saturday matinees at the neighborhood movie house. With this in mind, the Department of Trade and Development invited Ontario public and high school students to produce their own three-minute 8 mm. color films, portraying the

communities in which they lived. In centres such as Acton, Burlington, Oakville, Georgetown, Kapuskasing, Mindemoya, South Porcupine, Manitouwadge, and over 100 other cities, towns and villages in the provice, young film-makers of all ages have accepted the invitation. Their film handiwork will be viewed by visitors to Ontario Place, the 96-acre showplace in Lake Ontario, off Toronto's Canadian National

### Exhibition grounds.

Three minute film At Ontario Place, in one of the five "pods" of the giant exhibition pavilion, it is planned to have 288 of these films on view in a self-contained exhibit that utilizes a multi-programmed, multi-selector projection system. The visitor simply selects the place of interest to hlm, presses a button, and watches a threeminute silent color film made by

the students of that locality.

### Board returns surplus

It cost \$642.47 to educate each of the 30,674 elementary students in Halton County schools last year, Trustee Fred Armitage told the Halton County Board of education during a review of the budget at the board's regular meeting Thursday in Oakville.

It cost \$1,098.44 to educate each of the 14.832 secondary school students in the county and \$2,131.95 for each of the 79 students attending schools for the trainable retarded in the county.

103 more students The board had budgeted for 103 more elementary students than they had during the year and spent 14 cents more than they budgeted on each student.

On the contrary, secondary school enrolment was up by 242 pupils and the cost per student was \$1.01 below the budgeted figure and \$97 within the minister's guidelines on per pupil spending. Return to municipalities The board ended the year with

a surplus of \$783,075 and will

return \$577,019 to the



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
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
