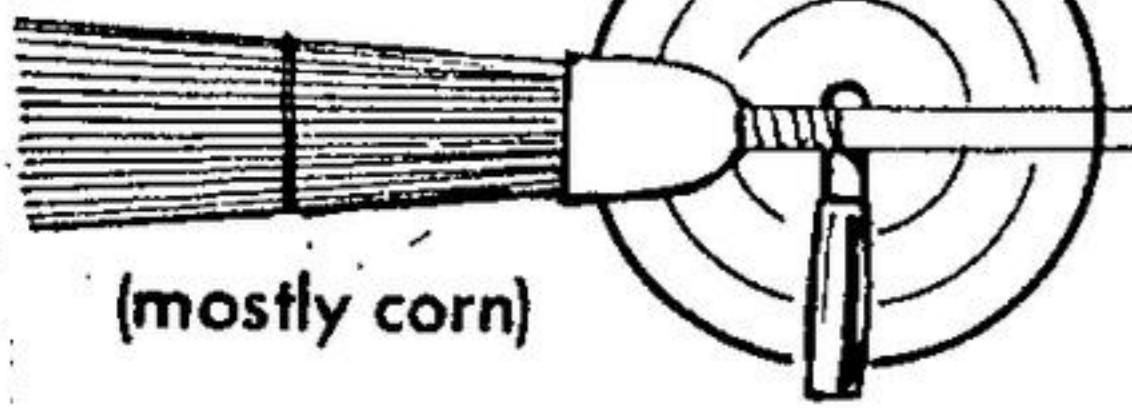

Susan McGilloway scores upset win

Slim, 17 year old, blonde-haired Sue McGilloway, representing Acton Lanes in the Youth Bowling Council Zone rollofs, bowled at the Park Royal Lanes in Clarkson Sunday and came through with an upset win to advance to the Ontario Finals.

Surprisingly enough, although Sue is a Senior Y.B.C. bowler, this is her first year of bowling, and she was not conceded much of a chance against her more experienced opponents who have come up through the bantam and junior ranks of Y.B.C. bowling.

Sue's three game roll was a credit to the adage "never give up". Her first game of 180, saw her keeping pace with the other singles representatives from Bramalea, Brampton, Georgetown, Port Credit, Milton, Oakville, Clarkson, Guelph and Streetsville. Her second game was a 182 but two fouls, caused by not clearing the deadwood from the gutters, lopped thirty pins off her score, reducing it to a 152.

Sue's courage and determination showed in her third and final game, when to the accompanying cheers of the spectators, she crashed through with six strikes in a row for the highest game of the day a 335. Her total of 667 saw her 22 pins ahead of second place Mary Polstra of Port Credit.

Sue's winning effort was the highlight of the Acton Y.B.C. bowlers who were also competing in the Bantam girls and boys' singles along with the senior girls and boys teams. In the Bantam girls' singles Susan Thompson rolled a 582 triple to finish in third place, sixteen pins out of first. In the Bantam boys, David Dunn's 510 triple placed him in fourth place, 51 pins behind the winner.
