Each pack presented numbers including playlets, songs and dances.

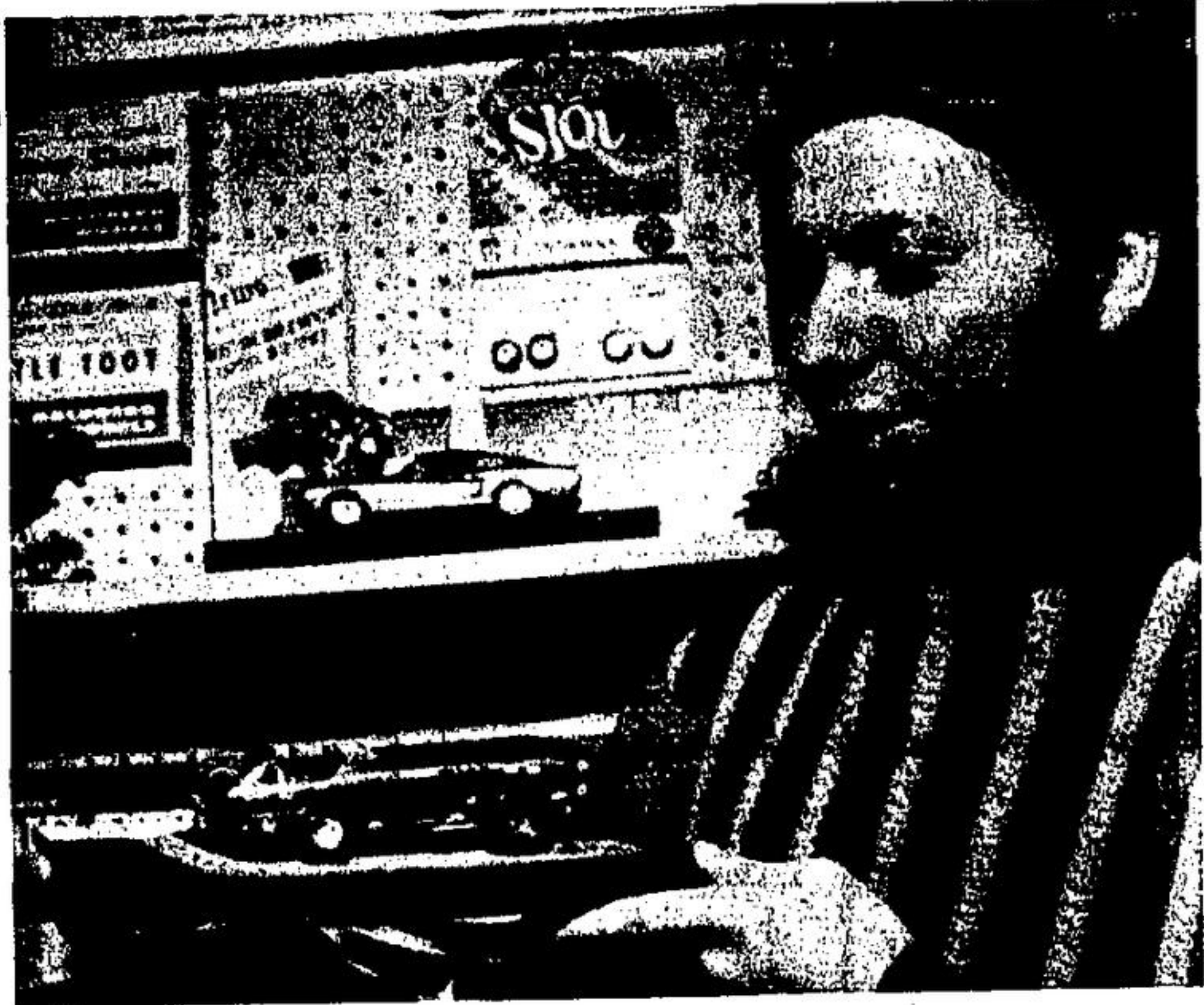

## "Rich" Stachyra's model catches judges' eye

Richard Stachyra's flashy Deora model car took first prize in the Sports Corner model car contest. He won a car kit of his choice, a model airplane kit and an engraved trophy for his

painstaking work. Basically the model started out as a Deora by A.M.T., the nose was molded flush with epoxy for streamlining and body seams were puttied with white epoxy

and sanded smooth. The top was also cut off, leaving the windshield and frame.

"LU' Coffin" engine The engine came from the "LU' Coffin" by Monogram. The blower, scoop, belt are from a 1933 Willys by A.M.T. Headers are hand-made. The engine cover was removed and the frame altered to accept the engine. Many parts such as wheels, tires, twin parachutes, gas, brake pedals were scavenged from spare parts.

Extra detailing in the kit consisted of ignition wiring, fuel lines, spark plugs, electrical wiring, brakes on all four wheels and parachute release cords.

Five coats The body was sprayed with Testor's gold in five coats, sanded every other. It was then shot with five coats of Testor's candy green, sponged with gold, followed by three coats of green. Result was varying tones of candy green.

The finished result won the eye of the judges, who awarded it first place in a contest which attracted many entries.

## Three accidents lay two charges

During the reporting week February 14 to February 21, the men at the Acton detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police while working 208 hours patrolled 742 miles of town roads.

As a result of that patrol nine charges and 14 warnings were issued for various infractions of the Highway Traffic Act.

Three motor vehicle accidents were investigated in which the total estimate of damage was \$700. Two charges have been laid as a result of the officers' investigation; one of the charges was for failing to remain at the scene of the accident.

Four infractions of the Liquor Control Act resulted in two charges of being drunk in a public place, and two charges of minor consuming being laid. A charge of "Impaired Driving" and "Fail the Breath Test" was laid against a Georgetown man.

Other occurrences were a reported theft, an assault, two prowler complaints and a domestic assault.

A local business was found to be insecure by the officer on night patrol and was made secure.
