### **Business financing courses** urged for Halton high schools

Consideration should be given to providing a course in business financing for high school students that may some day set up their own business, Trustee Bill Lawson commented during a meeting with the Business Education Progress Council and the Halton County Board of Education at the board meeting in Oakville

Director of Education Jim Singleton commented further on the same line, noting a course dealing with consumer economics or a business course for the individual merited some consideration. He suggested a course be considered to cover pitfalls the consumer may fall into and noted many young people make mistakes early in their business life that are difficult to correct.

Consider grade 13

The committee reviewed courses offered in business education in accounting, data processing, marketing and related subjects. The board received recommendations at this time but the committee said consideration was being given to having a grade 13 business

At present it doesn't carry past grade 12. The council placed a lot of emphasis on making grade eight students more aware of what to expect. In their study they are taking into consideration the preparation at grade eight.

Council member Marnie McGregor said meetings were planned with business people from Sheridan College so the board can be aware of what Sheridan offers and Sheridan can become aware of what the high schools are doing.

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During the discussion it was noted business jobs are more readily available for women than for men. It was pointed out that the high school courses don't deal in specialization with boys' courses like they do with girls.


