

### Let's Play Bridge

If you look at these hands you won't see anything unusual about them. In fact, I wouldn't notice anything except that no one bid game when these hands came up at the Acton Bridge Club. West dealt with North-South

South is the only hand to hold enough points to open the bidding and he does so with a bid of one spade. North holds enough points (at least 10) to respond at the two level. After North bids two clubs, South must take some positive action. Two South players chose to hid just two spades and the bidding died right there. In another auction, West came in with diamonds and played at four diamonds, down several.

South's hand is worth at least seventeen points and I would count it for 18. South cannot rebid two spades which would show only 13 to 15 points. South must jump and the only jump available is to three spades.

North can raise this to four since he had sound value for his two club bid and three card support for spades as well.

On the club lead, declarer called for the queen. East should play low since it will not promote any tricks by covering. Declarer has several choices of play. Not necessarily the best, but one that worked well with these cards is as follows:

After the club queen holds, declarer draws three rounds of trumps being careful to win the third round in dummy. The club jack is led and again East refuses to cover.

A low club takes care of East's king, while declarer wins with the ace. A low diamond is won by West who shifts to hearts but it is too late. Declarer wins and enters dummy with the diamond queen. Declarer losers are discarded on dummy's good clubs, making six on a hand where most pairs bid to a part
