

Esqueuing postpones Hegedus campground

Request for special consideration in the form of an amendment to By-law 29-29 (Esqueuing township's agricultural holding by-law) to allow construction on a campground on Lot 28, Concession 7, was turned down flatly by Esqueuing council Monday night.

Lawyer Donald Steele made the request on behalf of Dr. Julius Hegedus, who owns 90 acres of land in the Cedar Springs motel area and proposes to operate a tourist camp ground under a franchise granted by Campgrounds of America.

May lose deposit

Mr. Steele told council Dr. Hegedus has already paid a large sum of money down to Campgrounds of America and was in danger of either losing his deposit or having the project deferred at least a year, if council did not grant its approval, that night. According to Mr. Steele, Dr. Hegedus has already received a letter of clearance from the Department of Tourism and Travel, a permit from the Department of Highways and a letter approving water and septic tank installation plans from the Halton County Health Unit.

Mr. Steele went on to point out Dr. Hegedus' land is in the area tentatively shown as "commercial" on the township's official plan, which is now being prepared. He added that in the plan for the Toronto-centred region the area is to be preserved for recreation.

"It all fits into what all departments indicate future uses might be. It's not as though he's (Dr. Hegedus) trying to interject anything," Mr. Steele explained.

Needs campsites

The tremendous need for more commercial campgrounds was cited by Mr. Steele as another reason why council should look favorably upon his request. Mr. Steele told council number of commercial campsites in Ontario increased from 58 in 1955 to 415 in 1966. "The demand for campsites is still growing," he said. Campgrounds of America has granted 400 franchises, but only a few have been granted in Canada.

Mr. Steele claimed a 75 unit campsite can contribute as much to a township as a 20 employee industry, without smokestacks and other undesirable attachments.

In reply, Reeve Tom Hill told

Mr. Steele council could not very well draw up an amendment to the holding by-law, while it is still being studied by the Ontario Municipal Board.

Voicing his own opinion, Reeve Hill said, "There'll be no amendments to this by-law until it's approved by the OMB. If we start making amendments it's only going to hold up the original by-law."

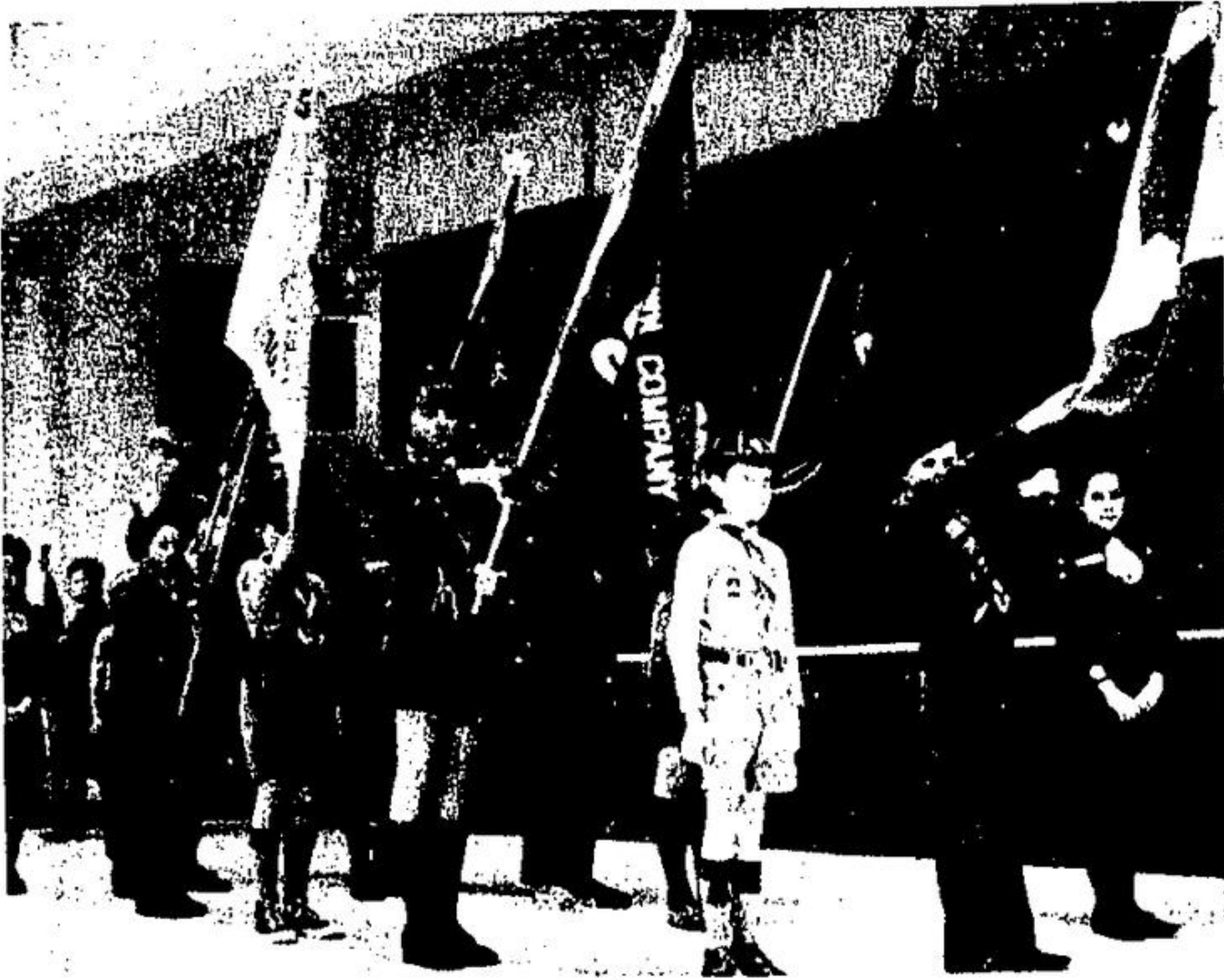
Councillor Dick Howitt agreed with the Reeve. He reminded Mr. Steele council must be consistent in their approach to all problems to do with the by-law.

"If Dr. Hegedus had been the only one, it would be a different situation, but we've been turning down people every week," he pointed out.

The holding by-law is presently being studied further by the OMB, after a one day hearing in February, at which objections to and support for the by-law were voiced.

"We'll have to keep turning people down until we get approval," Deputy Reeve Russell Miller commented.

Asks for resolution Noting the unanimous feeling of council against granting the special request, Mr. Steele asked

IF YOUR CHILD TURNS 21 OR BECOMES SELF-SUPPORTING
He or she must now be enrolled separately either through your child's group (if he or she is working where there is one) or on a direct basis. Pay Direct application forms are obtainable in banks and hospitals or from OHSC and OHSIP. If your child marries refer to "When You Marry" above.

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
