

Firefighters improvise to douse car blaze

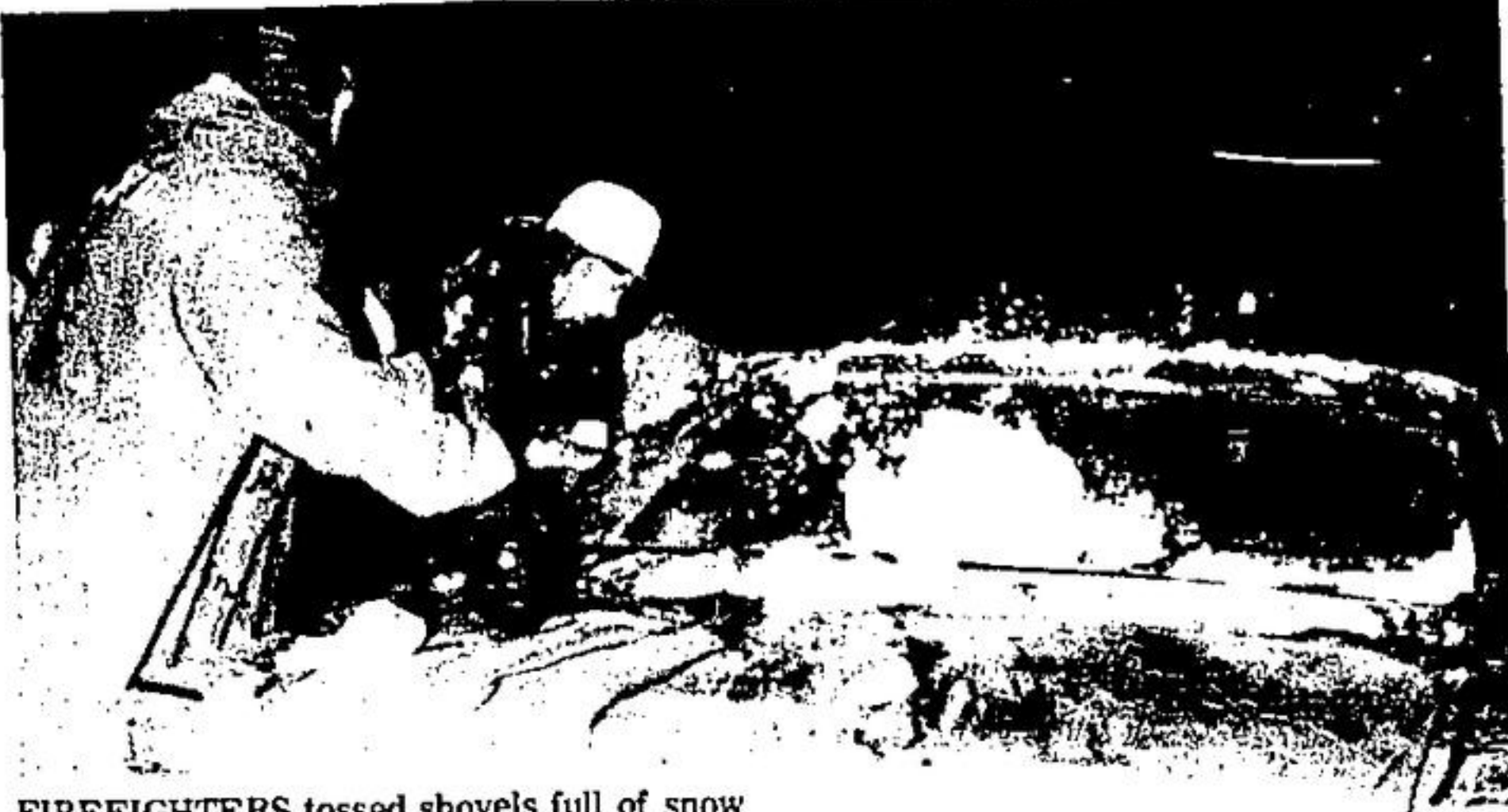
A 1967 Ford Fairlane belonging to Jack Ryman of Downsview was a total write-off, as a result

of a fire Saturday night about 8 on property on the Second Line of Nassagaweya, just south of 25

Sideroad. Mr. Ryman had been visiting inside the home for half an hour, when he noticed his car on fire. Cause of the blaze is unknown.

Acton Firefighters were forced to improvise, when the fire truck slid off the icy laneway leading to the home and became stuck in the snow. Brigade members hoofed it the rest of the way up the long laneway and threw shovels full of snow on the car to put out the flames.

The fire truck was towed out with a winch about half an hour later. The truck suffered no damage.

New R4 zoning

(Continued from Page 1) his support of the project he felt Altheo had accomplished this.

Proceed in pari: Mr. Barry said the project would go forward in stages, possibly in halves or quarters depending on the availability of financing. He felt there would be no problem in selling the town houses "because it is within the grasp of everyone."

Mr. Rosen felt the plan along with the co-operation of the municipality would produce housing which would meet the hopes of the town, the developer and the architect.

Held up: Amendment No. 6 to the official plan to classify a small area presently designated open space to residential is still held up at the Department. Denis Flood, the planning consultant, reported the Department was waiting "for a report from the Conservation Authority".

It was the general feeling that the project would not be held up waiting for this approval.

New requirements: Under the new classification in the zoning by-law as R4 some of the requirements are minimum of 2,500 square feet of land per unit; 20-foot side yard; 25 foot front yard and 25 foot rear yard setbacks; 120 foot frontage; 40 per cent landscaped area; 30 foot maximum height; 10 feet minimum distance between buildings with no windows; 25 feet between buildings with one window; and 50 feet between buildings with two windows; one and a quarter parking spaces per unit.

Each unit must have a minimum of 350 square feet plus 150 square feet additional for each bedroom.
Planning board recommended to council the zoning of the property as R4.

Recommendations: The planning board meeting was attended by chairman Sid Saitz and members Frank Simioni, Vic Bristow, Norm Elliott, Mayor Duby, Bill Coats in the place of deputy-reeve McKenzie, with planner Denis Flood and secretary Grant Usher. They discussed at some length the recommendations resulting from the joint council-planning board meeting last Dec. 3 to review the zoning by-law. The planning consultant was instructed to prepare the recommendation in a form suitable for inclusion in the by-law which will be discussed and modified at future planning board meetings before being recommended to council for inclusion in the zoning by-law.

O.P.P. report Break street lights

The week of Feb. 21 to Feb. 28 proved to be a very busy week for the officers at the Acton Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police.

A Break and Enter at a local residence is under investigation and the theft from a motor vehicle of stereo equipment.

A total of four youths were arrested on Saturday night for fighting in the street and have all been convicted and fined a total of \$225, in Provincial Court. Two domestic complaints were investigated. An assault took place during one of the disputes.

A local man was charged with Impaired Driving and another with being drunk in a public place.

Broken lights: In the past week, work crews from the Acton Hydro have been busy by young boys who have been breaking street lights. On three occasions they had to repair the entire lights on a street. Ice and snow on the streets and sidewalks make walking hazardous, but when the street is thrown into complete darkness then it is just dangerous.

All the boys connected in this offence have been located by the police. Many of the same boys have been stealing from local stores such items as candy and cigarettes and other small items. Four cigarette lighters and some cash have been recovered from the boys.
Two of the boys will appear in Juvenile Court and the rest have received warnings.
But this will be the last warning they will receive and if the warning is not taken then they will have to answer to the courts.

Appoint Coxe to committee

Esquering Council has appointed Councillor Len Coxe to serve on the Georgetown Fire Area committee along with Deputy-reeve Russell Miller and Councillor Wilfrid Leslie in spite of a warning by the reeve that Mr. Coxe might experience a conflict of interests by serving on Georgetown and Acton fire area committees simultaneously.

The deputy-reeve suggested the appointment, explaining Esquering is going to be allowed one more member on the committee.

Reeve Hill and Councillor Coxe represent the township on Acton fire area committee and Councillor Dick Howitt is the Esquering representative on Milton fire area committee.

"If there comes a conflict of interest between Acton fire area and Georgetown fire area, what are you going to do?" the reeve asked Mr. Coxe.

But Mr. Miller explained someone would have to double up if council hoped to have another

member on the Georgetown committee.
