

Chairman Bob Marshall is quick to point out however, that pressure is being brought to bear on the O.H.A. to have another year added to the age limit. The question will probably come up again at the O.H.A.'s annua meeting, the last Saturday of April. Players who are ineligible for play next season according to the present rule are therefore asked to attend Monday night's

A slate of officers will be elected at Monday's meeting and all persons willing to let their names stand for office or even helping in some small way are urged to attend.

Those elected at the meeting will meet with other interested parties from Galt, Guelph, Elmira, Fergus, Bramalea, Erla, Orangeville and Georgetown to the O.H.A. annual meeting.


