Eramosa township council briefs

At the regular meeting Monday, Francesa township council:

-Formed a committee of the reeve, deputy-reeve, chairman of the Rockwood trustees and members of the Rockwood and Eramosa Fire Department to arrange a grand opening for the new fire hall in Rockwood. Council also acceded to the request of the firefighters to paint the inside of the hall with voluntary labor and hire a painter to finish the job if it can't be finished in time for the opening.

-Asked the clerk to notify Rockwood trustees they would appoint an assistant dog controller for Rockwood when trustees submit names for the position. Council agreed the location of the dog controller, eight or nine miles from the village, wasn't conducive to catching errant canines. They acknowledged people must be annoyed at dogs destroying bushes and plants on their property.

-Following a complaint from J. Nelson of a drainage problem at the Third Line, a road tour was tentatively arranged for April 15 at 9 a.m. Councillors hope to tour all roads in the township with the road

superintendent. - Turned down a request from the Victorian Urder of Nurses for a grant. The VON requested money because the township was not canvassed for funds. Councillors generally felt the \$25,000 grant from Wellington County-including the 7 per cent township snare-was

sufficient. -Asked the clerk to notify Ontario Hydro to make a presentation to council of all plans and specifications for a proposed 276 KV line which preliminary drawings seemed to indicate followed the CNR tracks from Guelph to Acton. Hydro asked if the line would interfere with any existing or proposed work in the township but council felt the drawings did not include sufficient information.

-Donated \$25 to the Guelph branch of the Red Cross. -Discussed the \$11,066.57 levy from the Grand River Conservation Authority for administration, maintenance and capital costs but decided there was nothing to do but pay the levy. Cost is up approximately \$6,000 from last year a fact which bothered councillors but it was recalled an appeal two years ago had "got nowhere".

-Accepted the \$2,250 budget of the township planning board. Expenses included \$15 a meeting for eight members amounting to \$1,440 and \$1,100 for the township's share of the official plan they share with Guelph, Puslinch and Erin townships and village.

Passed a by-law stopping up a portion of Mill St. in the village of Eden Mills from the river at the east end to the pond on the west and conveying the property to Ross Campbell, who in turn conveyed a portion to Ted Barden.

-Approved payment of \$13,595.05, Eramosa's share of the Boles drainage works. Costs of the drain escalated from \$24,150 to \$27,478.06 because of delays and additional work on the project. -Granted the Eramosa branch of the Federation of Agriculture

\$350 for 1971 to be charged to all parts of the township outside of Rockwood and Eden Mills. -Authorized purchase of a new photo copier for the township of-

nces to replace the present machine which clerk Lloyd Hindley demonstrated was inadequate for the work. -Authorized the dog controller to purchase the equipment necessary to tultit duties. Mr. Martin explained he had been having

trouble rounding up stray dogs because of the lack of the necessary equipment and he felt a gun would help. -Passed a by-law to allow a special rate of five mills for Rock-

wood street lighting. It was explained costs of the lighting could not be charged to the general account so a special rate was necessary. -Confirmed the appointment of Monte Root, Jim Greenis, George

Smith, Bob Love, Lloyd Dyer, Herb Saunders, Harvey Pearl and councillors Bill Adsett and Ken Fair to the township recreation committee for 1971. After discussion it was resolved council should keep a representative from Eden Mills in mind another year for an appointment although council recognized the village had a very selfsufficient organization of its own.

Reeve Warren Parkinson presided for the seven hour meeting with deputy reeve Duncan McPhedran and councillors Bill Adsett, Ken Fair and Dick Strong present.

Let's Play Bridge by bill coats

A finesse has exactly a 50-50 chance of succeeding. One half the time the card you are finessing against will be in the second position and half the time

it will be in the fourth position. A good bridge player will do anything reasonable to increase these odds in his favour. A finesse is not taken just because it is there. When your contract seems to depend on a finesse look around and see if there is any way to avoid it.

Here is an example that occurred at the Riviera Club in Norval. South dealt with North South vulnerable.

S-A Q 8 4 D-10 3 C-10 7 2 S_J 9 T 2 H_VOID D-AKQ 97654

SOUTH S-10 3 H-K 10 8 6 5 3 2 D-8 C-A K 3

The bidding:

SOUTH WEST NORTH 1 H 5 D 5 H

Opening lead - Ace of diamonds.

As often happens with distributional hands, the bidding was fast and furious. No one is quite sure just what the other side can make so it's often best to bid on. North could double the five diamond bid. As the cards lie, this is down one or if you defend well - down two.

North is not sure that five hearts will make but it is sure

West led the diamond ace and continued with the king. Declarer ruffed and looked things over. One trick had already been lost

loser as well. To many bridge players it might appear that the only hope is a spade finesse. However, if the spade finesse will work now, it will work later as well so why

Draw trump


Declarer should draw the outstanding trump first. Then he should take the ace of clubs, the king of clubs and lead his last club. If West wins he can still try the spade finesse, but if East wins the third club, declarer can claim the balance. East must either lead a spade and give declarer a free finesse or he can lead any other suit and declarer discards a spade and ruffs in dummy. Five hearts bid and made, all because declarer didn't rely on a fiftyfifty chance.
