### Free choice of schools vetoed by county board

A motion that would have made it possible for students in Halton County Schools to opt out of the school they are sent to and theoretically attend a school of their choice in the county was turned down at the regular meeting of Halton County Board of Education Thursday in Oak-

Esquesing Trustee Bill Lawson told the board the change would cause administrative problems and would not work because of

the lack of public transportation.

No value Trustee Bill Priestner echoed Mr. Lawson's sentiments and said he could see no educational value in the idea. He pointed out the existing policy that allows transfers if certain options are not available in the school where a student is sent.

Georgetown Trustee Ernie Bodnar saw it as a means to provide administrative flexibility and allow staff to sort out thorny

problems.

Assistant to the Director Em Lavender suggested the plan had educational worth. He cited cases where parents move to the county from a place where their son or daughter had attended open concept schools. He said parents often wished to keep the child in that sort of school and others preferred to stay in the conventional school. Under present board guidelines the only reason for a change to another school is to take advantage of an option hot

Trustee Judy Alexander spoke in favor of the motion. She spoke of a case where a child from another area moved to Halton and was placed in a school that stopped at grade five. She suggested a child could have benefitted from being in a mixed

## Liberal leader Nixon charges farmers ignored

Ontario needs a revitalized Department of Agriculture and Rural Development, Liberal leader Robert Nixon told a gathering of 300 Wellington-Dufferin Liberals in Arthur Wednesday night.

Mr. Nixon lashed out at both the government and the NDP for their apathy towards agricultural problems.

Nixon charged Agriculture Minister William Stewart with "taking a caretaker's stance" on farmers' problems. Hog prices in Ontario are lower this year than in any year since 1950, he said. While egg producers require a price of 32 cents a dozen in order

to break even, the price of eggs is only 19 cents a dozen. at the same time, Nixon claimed he was ridiculed by the NDP when he brought up the matter of hog and egg prices

before the legislature. "In my view, the NDP is little or no threat in this riding or few others," he said.

regional to government, Nixon charged Municipal Affairs Minister Darcy McKeough left the department in a state of chaos.

He pointed to the decision of St. Catharines' city council (which recently voted 9-2 to petition the provincial government for the right to secede from the Ningara region) to back up his charge of soaring costs brought on by introduction of regional government.

"Regional government has no role to play in any area where it's going to increase costs with no comparable improvement," he suggested.

Promises reform If elected, Nixon promised to reform the cabinet and cut it in size. He claimed a cabinet of 12, sensitive to the needs of the community, is what's needed.

"The government should be decentralized," he said. Relocating offices of the government's department of agriculture in another part of downtown Toronto was a waste of money, according to Nixon.

Criticizing what he called "handout programs designed to buy votes", Nixon belittled the government's action in mailing out \$50 cheques to senior citizens just before Christmas.

"What a way to treat an important block of the industry of this province," he charged.

He laid the blame for previous

lack of action on senior citizens' behalf on both the provincial government and the Federal Liberal government of Prime Minister Trudenu.

Congrats to Cam Nixon congratulated Cameron Lush for showing the willingness to accept the Liberal nomination in an area where he admitted "Liberal fortunes have not been

"We've been making progress slowly," he sald. "We'll win because we discuss the issues and we offer an alternative to the party in power," he predicted.

He forecast 60 other Liberals including himself, Mr. Lush and Mr. Worton will be successful in the upcoming election. Present count Conservatives 68, Liberals 27, NDP 21 and Independents 1.
