Rates last year were \$2,400 for the mayor, the rest of council received \$15 a meeting.

ficial delegates to conventions or

meetings of municipal organizations. Mayor Les Duby explained that the \$20 convention allowance was to compensate for the day's work councillors would miss with attendance at such meetings. The \$20 rate for meetings was set to encourage attendance since a flat yearly rate tended to make some
