Understaffed
In north Halton, the audience learned, there is not one psychiatrist available, one psychologist with the Board of Education, and, apart from the Children's Aid, only one professional social worker, also with the Board of Education.

North Halton has from three to five public health nurses — well below the recommended figure of one nurse per 5,000 urban population or 3,000 rural population.

Simple precautions prevent accidents

It was a busy week for the officers of the Acton Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police. A total of 216 hours were worked with 681 miles patrolled, during the reporting week of April 18 to April 25.

The officers investigated three general occurrences, one Break Enter and Theft, one Disturbance and four thefts, one of which involved a motor vehicle.

There were two motor vehicle accidents investigated. One of the drivers involved has been charged with careless driving and Fail to Remain. Fortunately there were no serious injuries in either collision.

Simple precautions Drivers! One place not to stop your vehicle is on the travelled portion of a highway. This is both dangerous and illegal. If for any reason you must stop on a highway, always pull off onto the shoulder. Vehicles stopped on the travelled portion of a highway have caused many many serious collisions.

Also, when pulling back on the road again after a stop, make sure the road is clear and signal your intentions. These are simple precautions, but they can help prevent serious collisions.

Board will study self

In an effort to develop a more efficient, less expensive and generally better operation, Halton County Board of Education agreed Thursday to overhaul their operation reviewing priorities and expenditures.

In suggesting that an 18-man committee be established, Director of Education Jim Singleton said the Halton operation was operating at a per pupil cost lower than the vast majority of boards.

No panic He said the move was no cause for panic but recalled the board had been in operation for two and a half years and with the 1971 budget dealt with, the time was appropriate for such a study.

Four trustees, some members of the executive council, two principals and representatives from the teaching, secretarial, consultant and caretaking staffs will be on the committee. The board expects to complete the study by Jan. 1, 1972.

Objects to nursery school

A letter of objection to the all-day nursery school, proposed by Andrew Sonne, a resident of Lot 5, Con. 4, near Milton, was received by the Esqueving Council. Author of the letter, Derek Jones, whose property abuts the Sonne property, claimed establishment of the school would lead to devaluation of his own property. Mr. Jones also pointed out there is a pond between the properties and that there is no fence between the pond and the Sonne property.

He said he would feel uneasy about the establishment of an all-day nursery school there under such circumstances.

Council decided to discuss Mr. Sonne's request to establish the school and Mr. Jones' objection at the next committee meeting.
